

#### THE POWER OF PRAYER

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



A note from one of the project board members told of a study by a group of researchers on the power of prayer and how people benefit significantly from the prayers of others, even people whom they do not know. The message continued, "The researchers found the results astounding. Though they cannot explain how prayer works, none the less, it does work."

The President's Message is not usually of a personal nature, but my recent stroke and brush with my own mortality is still so vivid in my mind that I feel compelled to share the experience.

It all began as I was at my desk quietly proofreading a letter. Suddenly the words on the page became scrambled and I fell against the computer desk. I vaguely remember the doctor at my bedside, the ambulance ride through town to the hospital and being wheeled through the corridors to a room. During the week in ICU, I was told of an elderly Indian woman from the Mescalero Apache Reservation who was three doors from my room. She had a large family and her children, grandchildren and other members of her family had brought eagle feathers, many of them handed down as sacred heirlooms from generation to generation. (Only Indians are legally allowed to possess feathers from these protected birds.) The feathers were hung about her room to ward off evil spirits and to protect her during her recovery. Happily she did recover and left the hospital before there was an opportunity for me to meet her.

As I lay in bed during that long week, and the weeks that followed, not knowing what would be the outcome of the stroke, words from Isaiah 40:31 began running through my mind—"...those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary; they will walk and not be faint."

In a few days, lovely cards and notes began arriving from P.E.O.s and friends who had become aware of my problem. Those dear messages became symbolically MY eagle feathers, representing the many prayers being offered in my behalf.

The cards and notes continued to arrive expressing love, concern and encouragement and each one was gratefully read and re-read—many

even memorized. My most heartfelt thanks for your love, your concern, and your prayers. According to my doctors and therapists, my progress has been more than satisfactory and it must be the power of prayer that surrounded me.

The last paragraph of our Objects and Aims which we recite at each chapter meeting admonishes us to "...express a loving concern for each sister." This unique quality sets our Sisterhood apart from other organizations and the love and concern for one another draws us closer together. May we ever hold fast this very special characteristic of P.E.O.

The month of March is a time of transition in all local chapters. It marks the ending of one P.E.O. year and the beginning of another. We are grateful to those members who have completed terms as officers in their chapters and we congratulate those who have accepted the challenge of leadership for the coming year. May the thrill of accomplishment be realized in past and future service.

## THE PAST IS PROLOGUE

## THE FIRST DAY

Do we know what kind of day it was on January 21, 1869? We can only imagine. We do know Hattie Briggs and Franc Roads were sitting on a stile on the campus of Iowa Weslevan College in Mt. Pleasant, visiting with each other as friends do, so we must suppose the day was a mild one. There are many days like that in January in southern Iowa. The weather can be capricious—one day cold and snowy, the next deceptively balmy.

We shall assume the day was relatively warm and the sun was shining brightly. Hattie and Franc were laughing and talking that morning about inconsequential matters, then their girlish conversation turned to a more serious topic. They had much affection for each other and for their other friends. A chapter of I.C. Sorosis had been established on campus a month and a half before. Some of our Founders had been asked to join the club but not all of them. So on that January day. Hattie and Franc discussed the I.C.s and their own responsibility for the social life of the college. Suddenly Hattie said, "Let's have a society of our own."

That was a prophetic statement, as we know now.

When any decision is reached, the effects on the future can be varied. Some decisions make not even a ripple on the surface of life's river and others cause huge waves. Hattie's idea was momentous in the effect it had on untold numbers of women who have become P.E.O.s and others

who have felt the influence of those members.

That day continued to be of great significance. Hattie and Franc set out to find the others—Alice Bird, Mary Allen, Ella Stewart, Alice Coffin and Suela Pearson—to let them know what was being considered. That afternoon the seven met in the Music Room on the second floor of Old Main. Alice Bird had written a simple 35-



word oath earlier in the day and, as she was its author, she was the first one to take the oath, then she, in turn, gave it to the others. Would that we could have witnessed that dramatic moment when P.E.O. was born! Before the meeting in the Music Room ended, 1) the society was named, 2) the star was

chosen for the emblem, having been suggested by Alice Coffin, 3) Alice Bird was designated to prepare a constitution, and 4) the next meeting was set two days hence at the home of Mary Allen. What a first day that was! \$\price \tag{\tag{7}}

# It's All in a Day's Work... At the White House

hat do Americans want when it comes to health care reform? Seventy-five P.E.O.s from the District of Columbia had a chance to find out when they were invited by First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton to work in her office for a day.

The outcome of the current debate in Washington over the shape of health care reform is one that will affect all Americans. President Bill Clinton appointed his wife the head of a task force that developed a plan to tackle the problems of this country's health care system. In her role as task force chairman, Mrs. Clinton repeatedly asked for input from everyone involved or affected by health care reform. From across America, they responded. Doctors, nurses, physical therapists, lawyers, acupuncturists, mothers, fathers, senior citizens, hospital administrators, chiropractors, and massage therapists to name a few. Some had private meetings with the First Lady or her staff. Others had telephone conversations with her. The large majority, however, wrote.

The result: literally tons of mail to be opened, sorted and answered.

It was when we learned of the backlog of correspondence and the need for volunteers to sort it that Chapter AF in the District of Columbia contacted Mrs. Clinton's office. We reasoned that this kind of volunteer assignment had nothing to do with partisan politics. Health care reform is an issue that will affect the entire country, and the chairman of the presidential task force needed to know what Americans thought about it. Her mail should be open so that the people sending the letters would have their views included in the process.

In the letter to Kelly Carnes, Director of First Lady's Correspondence, we gave background on the P.E.O. Sisterhood, emphasizing our deep commitment to service in the community and education for

women. We explained that we could assemble a group of very high quality volunteers from among the P.E.O.s living in the Washington area. The response from the First Lady's staff was, "How soon can you come?"

A Saturday in July from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. was our assigned work period. Fliers were sent to all 32 chapters in the District of Columbia inviting the first 75 P.E.O.s who responded to go to the White House.

The majority of us began the day early with a special celebration of the P.E.O. projects and our commitment to promoting educational opportunities for women. We gathered for breakfast on the rooftop patio of an office building just three blocks from the White House. Chapter AF organized this early start to the day to give all the volunteers a chance to socialize

before going to read mail. P.E.O.s munched on coffee cakes, muffins and fresh fruit. Almost \$300 was raised for the P.E.O. projects.

When we arrived at the Old Executive Office Building which is part of the White House complex, we were expeditiously processed through White House Security. All of us had submitted our name, address and date of birth so that we could be screened and cleared in advance. Mrs. Clinton's staff escorted us through the magnetometers to the historic Indian Treaty Room. The 12 rectangular folding tables with a mound of mail in the center of each seemed incongruous in the middle of the ornate room, but after a welcome from Stacey Roth of Mrs. Clinton's staff and a short briefing on our assignment for the day, we went to work.

The majority of us read mail and coded it according to 10 to 12 categories pre-identified by Mrs. Clinton's staff. We were intrigued by the wide variety of solutions for health care reform offered to the First Lady. We giggled at some of the personal advice that many Americans felt free to offer ranging from "use your husband's last name," to "don't use your husband's last

name," to "take good care of Socks, your cat." There were also quiet moments as we read the more deeply personal letters, such as the one from the family who has used its life savings to pay medical bills for a sick child, or the problems an elderly man has had to obtain care for his wife afflicted with Alzheimer's disease.

Our work was interrupted only long enough to dine from a buffet of sandwiches, potato salad, chips and cookies. We also received a private tour of the newly refurbished Old Executive Office Building. In addition to the decorator wall colors, several rotundas were restored back to their original state with vibrant colored stained glass. The tour also included Vice President Al Gore's stately office complete with historical antique furnishings and other art objects.

At the end of the day, District of Columbia P.E.O.s had processed over 7,000 pieces of mail. Mrs. Clinton's office was pleased with our work, and so were we. It was very satisfying to make this modest contribution to our democratic process...particularly when we could do it together as P.E.O.s. \$\price \text{?}

## P.E.O.'S QUASQUICENTENNIAL

#### THROUGH THE ADOLESCENT YEARS (THE FIRST 25 YEARS, 1869-1894)

Someone aptly called the time period in the beginning of P.E.O. the adolescent years. The organization was rapidly growing and out of the growth, changes emerged. As chapters grew, the need arose for a governing body for them. Out of this need was developed the Grand Chapter. Later, the state chapter was begun. Also during this time, The P.E.O. RECORD—called by some P.E.O.'s first project—was published. The following recaps of these major events will help us continue through this year to celebrate 125 years of P.E.O.

#### The Development of State Chapters and Supreme Chapter

When Alice Bird Babb welcomed the 19th Biennial Convention of Supreme Chapter in 1909, she said, "I stand before you flooded with memories, astonished with results, and most hopeful for the future." How astonished she would be if she could look back with us now during our Sisterhood's 125th year.

In 1869 our seven Founders banded together in friendship, and our Sisterhood was established. A document was written which they called a constitution. It wasn't that at all--it was a creed, a declaration of belief and purpose, but it was their earliest system of laws, and in its present form is now our Objects and Aims.

As the years slipped by, friends were invited to join their "P.E.O. Society." Then, when the alumnae left college and moved back home or to other towns, it was only natural to invite best friends in those towns to join, and thus another group would be formed.

It was not until several years later, when the number of P.E.O. societies had grown and there had to be a way of designating one from another, that the plan of using the letters of the alphabet was adopted,

and the word "chapter" was used.

For 13 years the Mt. Pleasant chapter was, in a large sense, the governing body. Not that they exercised much authority, but most questions were referred to them, since they had founded the Sisterhood and were supposed to know most about it.

However, the spirit of a more democratic government gradually became evident, and Chapter A was willing to accede to the wishes of the majority. A meeting was accordingly called to be held in Bloomington, Iowa, in 1882, to which all seven chapters were asked to send two delegates. A constitution was adopted and plans were made to meet again in Fairfield, Iowa, the following year, at which time the Grand Chapter of P.E.O. was organized. In this Grand Chapter was vested the legislative and judicial powers of the Sisterhood.

All went well in P.E.O. under the jurisdiction of the Grand Chapter, although there was now and then a suggestion of state organizations. It was at the convention at Mt. Pleasant in 1889 that Nebraska made a formal request to form a state chapter, and Nebraska Grand Chapter was organized as the first state chapter in April 1890 in Omaha.

When Nebraska's charter was issued, it was printed as having been granted by "The Grand Chapter of the State of Iowa." It is not known whether "of the State of Iowa" was added by mistake of the printer or

In 1889 our colors, gold and white, were selected. Because gold was too difficult to find, the colors were soon changed to yellow and white.

Many suggestions were received regarding the selection of the flower for P.E.O. The marguerite, a modest, delicate flower, easily grown but still not common, was chosen in 1893.

by the mistaken judgment of some individual or of some committee; but it was a mistake. When Nebraska Grand Chapter sent delegates to the Grand Chapter convention in October 1890 they asked for a higher governing body, to which Iowa and other states, as well as Nebraska, should be subordinate.

It was seen that in order to have the ideal connection among the state chapters, there must be a general and common head, so that all questions arising between the states could be discussed clearly and fairly. In October 1892 at Des Moines, Iowa, Supreme Grand Chapter was organized, making each local and state chapter an equal part of the whole. Nebraska was then given a new charter. Two more state chapters were formed during these first 25 years—Iowa State Chapter in 1893 and Missouri State Chapter in 1894.

### Writing it Down THE P.E.O. RECORD

Would the growth of the Sisterhood and the spirit of sisterly love have survived the test of time without the medium of THE P.E.O. RECORD? We may never be certain of the answer, but we do know that the magazine has had a tremendous impact on the organization.

THE P.E.O. RECORD was born of need. In the beginning, P.E.O. chapters exchanged letters, just as one sister writes to another. They told the chapter happenings, the new members, what girls had been married, for they were all young girls then, and shared all sorts of interesting intimate news

By 1883 seven chapters had been formed and Grand Chapter came into being. Official information, including lengthy convention minutes, had to be handwritten and sent to all chapters. This duty fell, for the most part, to the corresponding secretary and recording secretary of Grand Chapter. It took five years of handwritten minutes, several suggestions, and much convention discussion before a decision was made to publish a "society paper," as it was called.

THE P.E.O. RECORD, as it was named, was established on the twentieth anniversary of the founding of P.E.O. Effie Hoffman Rogers, Grand Chapter president, was chosen as editor with a salary of \$40 a month. The annual subscription price for the monthly magazine was set at 75 cents—payable in advance. All chapter corresponding secretaries were instructed (they used the word "commanded") to prepare material for the paper.

In January 1889 Volume I, Number 1 of the official publication of our Sisterhood was – issued and sent to 400 members in 21 chapters.

Only faith and \$500 backed the first magazine. In the first issue Effie Hoffman Rogers said, "We intend to give you 16 pages, two columns per page, of good reading matter, pure, clean and helpful. We trust it will be a welcome visitor to your hearts and homes." At the end of 10 months she reported: "I have folded, stitched, covered and mailed 4,850 RECORDS. I have done more than 15 miles of stitching." Another editorial chore of the time was writing by hand the name and address of each subscriber on the cover of the magazine.

When our magazine came into being, ours was still a male-dominated society and a woman's prime function was to marry (as soon as possible) and produce children. A quote in an early issue states: "They say a girl only needs enough reading to study the Bible, enough arithmetic to count her egg money and enough geog-

raphy to find her way around the kitchen." She couldn't vote and had few legal rights, no economic power and no social position without her husband.

Over the years there has been vast change and growth in our lives because of social changes in history, and THE P.E.O. RECORD has preserved not only the history of P.E.O., but it has also preserved events of historical value for future years.


Perhaps it was prophetic that the first article in the first issue of THE P.E.O. RECORD was entitled "Faith." It carries no byline, but its theme and style might have been written by the assistant editor, Alice Bird Babb, one of the Founders.

Also in that issue was the "Sunday Afternoon Corner," later termed "Religious Column" with quotations and articles by leading clergymen of the day. There were inspirational poems and fillers through its 16 pages.

An article "Petty Meanness of Women" has the conquest of malice and jealousy as its theme. "Let us each establish a guard over our ears and tongues, and above all seek for an in-letting of divine light of charity into our inmost hearts, giving us a warm and friendly feeling for all humanity and killing spite, malice and envy."

There were also some

#### HOUR OF REMEMBRANCE AT THE 1993 MICHIGAN STATE CONVENTION

Tread recently about the spiritual traditions of the Aborigines of Australia, which revolve around songlines—invisible maps that carry them along and are passed down through the generations to guide the people through life. These songlines are never written down, merely whispered and sung to each new generation and taught through the examples of daily living.

Isee P.E.O. as a modern day songline guiding my life and the lives of my sisters, and as I hear the list of names read here today, names that are time markers—Florence, Winifred, Esther, Eleanor, Frances—I am struck by a sense of continuity. These names remind me that I am part of a continuing philosophical stream that is directly connected to these women who, even though the specifics of their lives might have been very different from the ones I know, were guided by traditions and principles that remain constant—principles that are the foundation of the P.E.O. songline. P.E.O.s are women who have always had a commitment to lifelong learning. No matter what form this takes, the ideals remain the same. They are our Objects and Aims.

These guidelines, coming directly from the hearts of seven women over 100 years ago, and lived through the lives of Florence, Dorothy, Mildred, Esther and on to another generation of names—Betty, Ruth, Dorothy, Nancy, Barbara, and then to Chris, Amy, Karen and Debbie, and soon to be passed to Nichole, Erin, Shannon and Ashleigh. Many children create imaginary friends around the age of three. These companions are very real, and young children can spend a great deal of time in their company. This phenomenon has presented an interesting challenge to sociologists who decided to study the effects of such relationships. Some very interesting data appeared. Boys tended to

create friends who were vastly superior to themselves in their abilities to control the world around them. Girls, on the other hand, created friends who were much less experienced and needed to be nurtured and taught, helped along the way. These very young children are already responding to the roles society has created for them, or maybe they are just responding to a human songline—a memory too powerful for society to overcome. Whatever the interpretation, the process is one that provides the child with practice in perfecting social skills and strengthens their ability to interact successfully with others.

and teach each other the true, practical, everyday applications of the aspirations and ideals of our sisterhood. I know that I am richer for my association with each of my sisters both past and present. Each song helps keep me on the path in a time when external markers are few and the choices are many. My association with each of them has taught me to appreciate the special qualities that each brings to this world, and makes the world a bigger place. The influence of my relationships with individuals all committed to the qualities expressed in our Objects and Aims enriches my life and improves my own contributions.

## "COME FLY WITH US!"

**PROGRAM FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION** 

An applicant must have an educational goal that is attainable within a period of 24 consecutive months and offers good prospects for employment. Without meeting these minimum requirements, the flight can't go.

Welcome aboard International Airline's P.E.O. Program Education Friend Ship! Come fly with us today as we compare the PCE application process with an airline flight. Some applications like some airline flights are completed routinely without encountering any problems. Others experience delays and occasionally are aborted before they can reach their destination. Our purpose is to show you how to make your application process routine.

In case you're not familiar with us, we're a large airline based in Des Moines, Iowa. We began our Friend Ship Service in 1973 and we fly to all 50 states and Canada. Like most major carriers, we operate on the hub and spoke system, so all passengers and applications travel through Des Moines en route to their various destinations.

Before our "flight" (the application process) can leave the gate, the "crew" (the trustees) must obtain the proper paperwork from "dispatch" (the PCE secretaries in Des Moines). Dispatch has checked to make sure the paperwork is accurate and complete before sending it to the crew.

After the crew has received its paperwork, they head for the airplane where they do the walk around to make sure the airplane isn't missing any major parts or displaying large puddles indicating loss of necessary fluids. Having accomplished that, they go inside to set the cockpit up for flight. Once the controls have been properly set for flight, the crew will run the preflight checklist.

Let's look at what might delay or even cause a cancellation in our flight. *Turbulence*, **OUTDATED FORMS:** Things can get pretty rough if you use an outdated form. You can obtain current forms from your state, provincial or district PCE chairman or from the P.E.O. Executive Office. Please use them.

Missed Approach, NOT ENOUGH TIME ALLOWED FOR PROCESSING: Chapters must allow six to eight weeks for processing prior to the date of need for a grant which is listed on the application. The date of need must reflect the date payment is due, not the date school starts. If you don't allow enough time, your applicant will miss her target date.

Low Visibility, NOT ENOUGH INFORMATION GIVEN IN CHAPTER LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION: Give a complete picture of the applicant's life situation, her goals, need and financial resources. This very important letter could make the difference between whether an applicant is approved for a grant or denied.

Air Traffic Control Delay, A.D.C., FOOD STAMPS, OR CANADIAN

WELFARE ASSISTANCE: If an applicant is receiving government assistance funds, a signed authorization form must be included advising the trustees that the awarding of a grant would not reduce any public assistance benefits currently being paid to the applicant. These forms can be requested from the P.E.O. Executive Office.

Flight Plan Not Filed, INCOMPLETE PAPERWORK: Each item on the form must be completed. All materials for application are to be assembled by the sponsoring chapter and sent in one mailing to the PE.O. Executive Office in Des Moines. If there is missing information, the application will be returned to the chapter causing a flight delay for certain.

FAA Violation, IMPROPER USE OF GRANT MONEY: Grant money may be used for tuition, books, supplies, transportation or childcare necessary to reach the applicant's educational goal. It may not be used for living expenses or past educational expenses.

Weight and Balance Problem, INCOME AND EXPENSE STATEMENT OUT OF BALANCE: There should be a good balance between monthly income and monthly expenses, showing that the applicant's goal is financially realistic with the help of a PCE grant. If there is a deficit, the applicant must furnish the financial plan she will use to complete her education, including such sources as scholarships, loans, family help, employment, etc. Income and expenses must be in balance for the plan to fly.

Destination Weather Below Minimums, APPLICANT'S GOAL UNATTAINABLE: An applicant must have an educational goal that is attainable within a period of 24 consecutive months and offers good prospects for employment. Without meeting these minimum requirements, the flight can't go.

Now, if all of the items on our PCE checklist have been properly checked, our flight (application) will have reached its final destination. By following all of the above checkpoints, you will ensure a smooth approach and a safe landing. Once the application has been properly submitted, final approval is given by the trustees who determine whether a grant is awarded or denied. It should be noted that the Policy Guidelines and Procedures for the 1994-1996 biennium have been revised, and they will be published in the 1994 May-June issue of THE P.E.O. RECORD. Please keep this issue for reference.

A reminder about refueling. No airplane can operate without enough fuel, and neither can PCE. The fuel that keeps our PCE Friend Ship running comes from P.E.O. chapter contributions, and gifts and bequests from P.E.O. chapter members and others. Individual gifts are tax-deductible. We depend upon you to keep our tank filled with fuel, so we can continue to keep our Friend Ship running and deliver our many "passengers" (the applicants) to their ticketed destinations. The grants you make it possible for us to award are making a positive difference in the lives of the recipients and their families who are benefiting from your generosity and thoughtfulness.

# "WITH LOVING CONSIDERATION..."

**Many applicants** have said how grateful they are for the opportunity to reflect, assess and write about life goals, and outline steps toward achieving them. "Whether or not I receive an award, writing the proposal has been a personal benefit to me," one applicant wrote. "I took the chance to really look at where I want to be in ten years and wrote out a plan for getting there."

As this issue of THE P.E.O. RECORD is delivered, the board of trustees for P.E.O. Scholar Awards is meeting in Des Moines to select recipients for the 1994-1995 academic year. The 611 nominations from local chapters have again produced an impressive group of graduate level women who represent both a multiplicity of fields and a broad geographic distribution. What, during this most difficult selection process, prompts the final choice of those who will become P.E.O. Scholars?

The procedure involves both elimination and affirmation, entered into with humility, empathy, and a spirit of loving consideration by the trustees. Before the evaluation process begins, a number of nominees are, of necessity, withdrawn because they did not submit applications or they requested their files be closed. Although it is not a requirement for chapters to ascertain a potential nominee's interest in the program before submitting her name, it would be helpful to do so. When completed applications arrive at the Executive Office, they are screened for eligibility. An additional number of applications are removed from consideration because the applicants' program completion dates do not fall within the project guidelines. Scholars selected in March of 1994 (nominated September 1 to December 31, 1993) will receive their awards August 1, 1994, to use for the fall 1994 term, and the spring 1995 term. Nominees scheduled to complete prior to spring 1995, or after spring 1996, are ineligible for 1994-1995 awards. Unfortunately, due to the volume of applications, it is not possible to send a separate letter to applicants who are ineligible.

When files of eligible applicants are received by the trustees, each is read with thoroughness and care. (The applications arrive in large green and white mailers stamped "First Class"—a most accurate label!). From the spirit expressed in the chapter letter, through examination of transcripts, and reading of the three recommendations, a picture of the potential Scholar emerges, enhanced and refined by reading her proposal. In the applicant's proposal, a narrative of her hopes, dreams, short and long-term career goals and

her plans to achieve those goals, she expresses (reveals) her personality, direction, attitude and abilities. It is her opportunity to define herself. Many applicants have said how grateful they are for the opportunity to reflect, assess and write about life goals, and outline steps toward achieving them. "Whether or not I receive an award, writing the proposal has been a personal benefit to me," one applicant wrote. "I took the chance to really look at where I want to be in ten years and wrote out a plan for getting there."

Each trustee recommends applicants for final consideration. The recommendations are then correlated for discussion at the awards meeting. Any one of these wonderfully talented and capable final contenders would be worthy of a P.E.O. Scholar Award. Each has demonstrated outstanding academic excellence and achievement. Each has clearly stated goals which she is capable of reaching due to her intellect and dedication. But because the number of awards is dependent upon funds received and the direction of the project is competitive, there are further, often wrenching, selection decisions which must be made. During the awards meeting, through a process of discussion, weighing of information and continuing evaluation, the new P.E.O. Scholars are chosen. They are women of special grace and vision. It is a privilege to read their applications, to learn about them, and to know that P.E.O., through strong financial and emotional support, will play a major part in their bright futures.

The trustees do join, however, with nominating chapters in regret and sadness for the many qualified applicants who will not receive awards, and remain most grateful to these chapters for recognizing and nominating such extraordinary women. Although you make our job challenging, you fill our hearts with respect and inspiration.

The new P.E.O. Scholars will receive their letters of notification by May 1, 1994. We wish them celebration and joy. ☆



# ELF CONTINUES TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The following are highlights from Shevawn's story: "If anyone had told me five years ago that, with three children not two, I would go back to school to get my elementary certification requirements and begin work on my master's, I would have laughed. If anyone would have told Dennis (my husband) he would learn where the vacuum cleaner "on" switch is or that he would discover which brand of dishwashing soap he likes best, he would have laughed also. My father always told me never say never.

"Eleanor Roosevelt wrote, 'The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams.' And I had a dream and, thanks to so many people, I was able to follow that dream.

"I began substitute-teaching for the Mt. Carroll school district in January of 1990. It felt great! And almost a year later, on Christmas of 1991, Dennis said, 'Let's not talk about your going back to school any longer. Just do it!' Three days later, Mrs. Coatney, Chapter GA, Illinois, called with a possibility of financial assistance, just the push I needed. We were off!

"It hasn't been easy, but never once did I feel that I was doing it alone. While I was student-teaching, I found treasures in my mailbox on Fridays, or I found desserts on my kitchen table or I enjoyed yellow tulips or I received many warm dishes of food for which my family was grateful.

"At home, we had to be organized at night and be supportive and encouraging for each other while I was student-teaching. Reid (our youngest son) and I had to leave home at 5:50 a.m. every day. I used my travel time to get set for the day.

"We as a family are reaping the benefits already. My two oldest children are more responsible, dependable, and have learned to be empathetic and patient.

"My children saw how much work it takes to achieve a goal, how hard I worked to get "straight A's," and how important it was to me to do what I was doing. In my heart I know there are children's lives I can influence in a positive way and I have portrayed that also to my own children. I know there will be days I am challenged, but I know about challenges when it comes to children."

Much encouragement has been received from the community their family calls home. Shevawn tries to return the favor by "doing some things a little extra for someone else." "Everyone deserves the feelings of specialness I have been granted."

Highlights from Jane's experiences tell her story: "Medicine and music have been my major career interests since high school. By the time I graduated from high school, I had settled on a career in medicine. This decision was reinforced by my receipt that summer of a Minnesota Heart

Association Fellowship, which allowed me to work in several areas of clinical research at the Mayo

"Although I began college as a pre-med student, by the end of my freshman year I found my involvement in music eclipsing my medical aspirations. Music came far more easily to me than calculus or chemistry, and with it I felt I had found a way to reach people spiritually and emotionally. I was graduated cum laude with departmental distinction in music and

decided to pursue a graduate degree in violin at the University of Illinois."
Following time spent teaching, performing professionally and beginning an orchestra program in a community school district, Jane began to

feel the tug of her interest in medicine. With the successes of her brother and a close friend in medical school in mind, Jane enrolled as a part-time pre-med student while continuing many of her performing and teaching

duties. "Needless to say, the sheer volume of my commitments was overwhelming. I soon realized that I must focus my time and energy on my studies, and to that end I resigned my teaching position and enrolled full time at Cornell College." Following completion of pre-med requirements, Jane spent a year teaching as a "Visiting Chemistry Instructor" at Cornell College followed by a summer research position. She then entered medical school.

"My experiences as a teacher and adult student have helped me to grow in self-knowledge and self-confidence, and to form new career goals. Medicine integrates the elements which I desire in a career: an opportunity to work closely with people, an intellectual challenge, and the perception that one's life has had a positive impact on others. In turn, the experience I have had as

a musician and teacher and my abilities to work with people will enable me to bring a great deal to the medical profession, and I eagerly anticipate meeting the challenges of a career in medicine."

It was with pleasure that I recently received a letter from Jane updating me on her progress. She is currently in her fourth year of medical school at the University of Iowa and has decided on a career in pediatrics. Notification of the location for her residency program will be received by mid-March.

## WIDOW AND "ORPHAN BOY" FIND KINDNESS AND KINSHIP WITH B&B

After this trip, and thinking of my wonderful P.E.O. hostesses, B&B for Bed and Breakfast doesn't explain the program to me. For me it is K&K for Kindness and Kinship.

After my husband Ward retired in 1985, he took me around the country on a Genealogical Goose Chase. I was looking for my ancestors, about whom I knew nothing. What fun it was to discover clues that led me farther and farther afield. He indulged me and enjoyed the hunt as much as I did.

Even after Ward was diagnosed with bone cancer, we went on one more ancestor hunt and planned another for 1992. It was not to be. His heart and strength gave out and he died.

When I had put my affairs in order I decided to take the trip we had planned: 7500 miles to research in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Massachusetts, Washington, D.C., Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas.

My family was horrified. I had celebrated my 70th birthday in July, and here I was planning this long trip across the country with only my dog "Orphan Boy" for company. When I hit on a plan to stay in P.E.O. Bed and Breakfast homes whenever possible, it helped convince them I would be okay.

The trip was planned around the places I wanted to research and overnight stops along the way from one state archive to another. The B&B listing in The Record was my guide. On August 23, the day of our 50th wedding anniversary, I had decided on my route and wrote the contact people in The Record.

The trip took 72 days and covered 11,090 miles. I spent 28 nights in hotels or motels, 28 nights in 11 P.E.O. B&Bs, and 15 with family and friends. On night 72 I was home.

My first B&B was in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with Ruth Roberts of Chapter EW. I wasn't sure exactly what to expect, or what was expected of me as a guest. Ruth put me at ease at once with her warmth and friendliness. She invited me to join her and her daughter for supper, later giving me a tour of the city. We had a lot in common—both of us were born in Texas and interested in genealogy.

The next day I was her guest at the Cowboy Hall of Fame, where she serves as a docent.

Next was in Conway, Arkansas, with Susanna Mobley, Chapter E, and her husband Jack. Formerly she was a nurse and he was a doctor, who now teaches at the local college. Both are interested in genealogy. We had long conversations on that and other interesting subjects during the two nights I spent with them. During the day I researched in the Little Rock Archives.

A trip across a corner of Tennessee and Kentucky led me to Ballwin, Missouri. There I would stay three nights with Marie Beedle, Chapter JG, and her husband Perry, while I researched Missouri State Archives in St. Louis. The Beedles had lived in Holland while Perry worked for Emerson, and they had been tracing their ancestors in Europe and the USA. Interesting people! And Marie made the best coffee I have ever tasted.

Five days after I left Missouri, I was in Wellesley, Massachusetts, with Charlotte Harrington, Chapter K, where I spent four nights, along with several other B&B guests who came and went while I was there. Charlotte was a dynamo. She worked in Boston three days a week, yet she managed to make my stay a real pleasure: good food, china and silver on lovely linens each morning, good conversations with her, her family and friends each evening. She loaned me books, and from one I learned that my ancestor Samuel Bridge had been one of the first settlers of the Northwest Territory. She also spoiled my dog.

My next B&B stop was in Arlington, Virginia, for six nights with Marjorie Garnett, Chapter X of D.C., and her husband Gwynn. Though in their 80s, they had other P.E.O. guests coming and going while I was there. Each morning for breakfast we had a different menu, which was served in the breakfast room overlooking the sylvan backyard. She cautioned me when I first arrived that Arlington had a leash and scoop law for dogs. I assured her

that Orphan Boy slept in the pickup, was walked on a leash, and I carried plastic sacks for cleanups. We got along famously though I was a disappointment to Gwynn because I could not carry a tune. To make up for it I copied the words and music to two cowboy songs and sent them to him.

While still in Arlington, I received a letter and a map from Janice Cross, Chapter I, of Raleigh, North Carolina. She wanted to be sure that I could find her home when I arrived. This was indicative of her care and concern the two nights I spent with her. She had written before suggesting that we go dutch for dinner when I arrived. This made me feel welcome before I even met her. After dinner she drove downtown to the state archives, so I would have an idea how to get there the next day. The next night she fed me supper and took me shopping. A lovely lady.

My next Bed and Breakfast was one night in Charlotte, North Carolina, where my hostess was Joyce Allen, Chapter C, and her husband Mel. I told Joyce that I had no research to do in Charlotte, but that I had heard it was the loveliest city in the USA and I wanted to see it. On hearing this, Joyce drove me around the city, which certainly lived up to its billing. When we got back to the house, Mel was grilling a steak for our dinner. He told me he wanted a copy of my planned book when it was published. He will get one.

It was on to Ashville, North Carolina, for my one night B&B with Phyllis Myron, Chapter AC. Phyllis was at her workout exercise when I arrived, so Orphan Boy and I walked around the wooded subdivision where she lives. She was a great hostess, a good cook who insisted on feeding me, and a retired librarian with an interest in many things, including genealogy. I wish I had given myself another day to really get acquainted with her.

From Ashville to Chattanooga, Tennessee, I drove through spectacular mountain forests. It was the middle of October, and the trees were alive with fall colors. Never before have I seen such beauty—not even my own beloved New Mexico could match it.

My Chattanooga hostess, Martha Knee, Chapter AD, lives in the suburb of Hixon. I prided myself on never getting lost on this trip, but I did get "confused" while trying to find her house after dark. She sent her son Michael to guide me home.

Her husband was visiting his parents, so it was she and Michael who greeted and treated me royally. Martha was interested in my research and said she would like to learn how and when her grandfather Peter MacNamany came from Ireland. Later I found the information on a passenger and immigration list and sent it to her from Houston.

When I arrived a little early in Lafayette, Louisiana, at the home of Beth Wallis (Chapter AT) and her husband Hugh, a car drove up and a cheerful lady got out. She said "You must be Jonette," and I replied, "Yes, and you must be Beth." She laughed, "No, I'm Midge, Hugh's sister. Their daughter had a premature baby and they are in Washington State helping her for six weeks. But I am to be your hostess for the next two nights in their house." I am sorry that I missed Beth and Hugh, but Midge, who isn't a P.E.O., was the perfect hostess and we had a great time getting to know each other. I met Jane, her lovely daughter, and Jane's fiance. Midge insisted on feeding me each night in addition to B&B. I learned to drink coffee, Louisiana style, from a demitasse cup—a marvelous tradition.

It was serendipity that my last B&B hostess of the trip was Betty Luntz, Chapter EP, Houston, Texas, and her husband Lee. It was old home week from the moment I arrived. They had been to Silver City on Elderhostel programs and we knew some of the same people and like the same things. Betty fixed dinner for us the first two nights. The first morning Lee insisted on leading me through the maze of Houston traffic to the right ON RAMP of the road to the library. The third night I was their guest at an Italian restaurant and the last morning they led me to the interstate highway that would take me to San Antonio and eventually home.

#### **History of Record Cover**

My husband and I were pleased to see the cover of the November-December 1992 P.E.O. RECORD, as we recognized in the reproduction of Patty Jo Tharp's poster the Alpine Hose tower in Georgetown, Colorado, where he spent summers as a child and teenager. In 1924, he became a volunteer member of the Alpine Hose and was the proud owner of a badge signifying membership.

There was no 911 telephone number to call in those days, and he recalls that in the event of a fire in town, someone would climb the ladder to the loft, ring the bell in the tower and call out the location of the fire from the window. Young boys were detailed to run to the Alpine Hose, take the cart (a vehicle with two enormous wheels) from the shed, take the shafts in their hands and trot to the fire where they were met by older volunteers who used the ladder, grappling hooks, fire hatchets and the long hose on a reel to smother the flames. Soon, almost everyone in town gathered to watch the fire-fighters.

The Alpine Hose was located on a hillside, and the boys had the help of gravity to reach the fire but had to trudge up the hill to return the cart and equipment to the building.

Our thanks to Patty Jo and to THE RECORD for a bright serendipity to this Christmas.

### **AUTHORS**



Red Lodge Landmarks, by Beverly Rue Wellington, CJ, Langley, Washington, is a 100-page soft cover book containing historical data and drawings on 52 significant homes, churches, cabins and business buildings in Red Lodge, Montana, and the immediate area. The book also contains a short history of the Red Lodge area. Beverly, a retired teacher, has published two books and penned a family history.

Jeannette Kinyon, KY, Fresno, California, has written *Over Home*, a story set in 1926 in Huron, South Dakota. The book captures the essence of rural, small-town America as seen through the eyes of a 12-year-old girl. It will



appeal to all who are interested in the customs and fashions of time past. The story is fiction and has a real-life mystery woven into the more important theme of Scharmann's relationships with her family and friends. Ideas for Scharmann's two sisters are drawn from Jeannette Kinyon's two real sisters, Lois Johnson and Margaret Voels, both members of KY.

Born in Huron, South Dakota, Jeannette has taught English and creative writing at Rapid City Central High School and South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. She is a former book critic for the Rapid City Journal. Previous works include *Prairie Architect*, F.C.W. Kuehn: His Life and Work, and coauthor of The Incredible Gladys Pyle.



Patricia Foulke, BX, Glens Falls, New York, and her husband Robert, have written Fielding's The Great Sights of Europe. The original Fielding guide, start-

ed by Temple Fielding in the 50s, is still being published. This book is concerned mainly with hotels, with a little bit on sightseeing. The Foulkes were asked to write their book, focusing on lots of sight-seeing in 22 European countries, with a few historic hotels in the appendix. The Foulkes have traveled and lived in Europe for the past 40 years, first with

small children, then teenagers and now just the two of them, spending most of some years on sabbatical leave there. They are interested in out-of-the-mainstream places, and the book is about sightseeing within major cities, day trips around the cities and excursions farther out.

Margaret Ott Onerheim, HR, Ottumwa, Iowa, has written a memoirs book, *Threads of Memory*. The book was published as part of the Iowa Heritage Collection Series. This collection features classic books about Iowa, selected for their insightful portrayal of the state and its people. The book, presented through the child's eyes, illuminates life in rural Iowa in the 1920s. The concise, vivid details of this era, and the realistic dialogue, give the book universal appeal.

Story Poems, by Mildred Fielder, BB, Tucson, Arizona, is her second (and last) collection of stories through the centuries to now. Ballads and legends range from 1700 BC, history dated when possible, to young men on the early railroads, pioneers in the western movement, war, all true stories. Action poems include golfing, wild snow skiing, childhood games, travel through America, Europe, South America, true experiences by herself and friends. There's even a section on Space—or What's Up There? Poems by Mildred have been published across the United States, in Italy, Belgium, Australia and Canada. They have been copied in Braille, used in Christmas cards by a national organization, were read on radio broadcasts, set to music, and were the subject of many lectures by the author.

Mildred has written 26 books, three being poetry and 23 popular history. She has received 430 awards in poetry and prose, 60 being national competition.



May Gray, J, Fort Smith, Arkansas, has written a book of poetry, Christmas Remembrance. The book is a record of Christmas recollections, celebrations, meditation and prayer. May is the author of seven books of poetry and one of poetry and prose. From early years May has loved, read, memorized, studied and written poetry. She is a Life Member of the

Poetry Society of America, a member of the National League of American Pen Women, the Kentucky State Poetry Society, and the Poets' Roundtable of Arkansas. This organization named her "Poet of the Present and presented her the C.C. Allard Cup as "Poet of the Year." She is cofounder of the Fort Smith Branch of the Poets' Roundtable of Arkansas.

May Gray's numerous awards include The Book Award sponsored by the National League of American Pen Women, the Poetry Society of America Dylan Thomas Award, The Grand Prix, sponsored by the Kentucky State Poetry Society in 1988, and the 1993 Merit Award presented by the Poets' Roundtable of Arkansas. Her poetry has been published and she has judged poems for state competitions in several states.

Susan Failor, EU, Columbus, Ohio, authored with James Bissland a cookbook entitled Bountiful Ohio. They spent two years and put 33,000 miles on their odometers searching for Ohio cuisine. Included among the 163 recipes in the book are dishes such as Heartland Corn Bread, Sara's Amish Dressing, Ohio Shaker Lemon Pie, Chicken Fricassee with Tomato Dumplings, Schmierkase Pie, Biddie's German Apple Cake and Aunt Ruth's Concord Grape Pie.

Frances Engle Wilson, DX, Tulsa, Oklahoma, has written a mystery-romance, Golden Spring. Frances inherited her love of writing from her newspaper editor grandfather, and she has published 13 romance and romantic suspense novels over the past 15 years. She is an ardent antique collector, and her readers will find an antique object or piece of furniture in each of her



books. She has searched for her "old treasures" in fascinating places and she uses all these colorful settings for her stories. Her new book, Love's Legacy, was scheduled out in January.



The Astonishing Armadillo, the latest work by Dee Stuart, FA, Plano, Texas, chronicles the life cycle of a small armored tank, otherwise known as The Astonishing Armadillo. The book is for readers aged 7-11, and has been translated into a Spanish edition for bilingual readers. Over two years of research went into the book. The many color photographs illustrate the feats of this remarkable animal, which has

migrated from South America to Texas and now to the East Coast.

"While known best in the Southern United States, particularly in Texas, there are many people in the South, as well as in other areas of the country who are unaware of the unusual characteristics of armadillos," said Dee. "Although many people consider them pests, they devour countless insects, including fire ants, and are even helping scientists in the search for a cure for leprosy."

The Astonishing Armadillo is Dee's first book aimed at the children's market. It has been chosen as an Outstanding Science Trade Book for Children by the National Science Teachers Association-Children's Book Council joint committee.

Author of over 21 books, Dee is also known for her romance, mystery and historical novels. Her articles and short stories have appeared in numerous national publications, mystery anthologies and a reading program published by Reader's Digest. Dee also leads writing clinics and workshops in the Dallas area and is chair for the 1994 Craft of Writing Conference to be held at the University of Texas at Dallas.

Her next foray into the children's market, The Mysterious Fliers of the Night, a book about bats, and her suspense novel, Blood Ties, are both scheduled for publication in 1994.

Gladys Waddingham, HN, California, has written History of Inglewood.

The 93-year-old author was chosen for the task because she has lived in Inglewood over 70 years. When she first came in 1922 to teach Spanish at Inglewood High School the town was only 34 years old and the school 17. She knew most of the people she wrote about, not only the pioneers, but those who



made later history, since in 45 years at the school she had over 10,000 students. The last book written on Inglewood history was published in 1947.

### **AUTHORS**



Chapter G, Flagstaff, Arizona, has three published authors. All are, or have been, professors at Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff.

Evelyn Lewis (left) has just had published the sixth edition of *Housing Decisions*, a text used in high schools and community colleges in all 50 states and in Canada. This book introduces students to all phases of housing and aids them to make wise choices. Evelyn was professor of home economics at NAU prior to her retirement.

Lynda Hatch's Pathways of America: The Oregon Trail, was chosen as a selection for the Scholastic Book Club, geared to the elementary school student and teacher. The idea for the book came from a lack of such material available when Lynda taught fourth grade in Oregon, where she was chosen 1982 Oregon Teacher of the Year. Three more Pathways books follow. Lewis and Clark is already available, and The California Gold Rush Trail is coming up. The Santa Fe Trail is on the way.

Marilyn Brandom has published A Guide for Using Software in the Music Classroom, co-authored by Penny Pursell Engler. This book filled a need for coordinating resource material to be used with all published music texts. It is used in schools in 48 states and Canada, as well as three countries in the Pacific Rim. In the summer of 1993, Marilyn was one of 15 musicians chosen to join People to People Ambassadors to Vietnam, where the delegation met with and acted as consultants to music educators in that country. Marilyn is an accomplished organist, having been a church organist at the age of 15. She is Professor Emeritus in music education (organ) at NAU, and still gives several recitals a year.



Ruth Walrath, EH, Tequesta, Florida, has published her original poems in a book titled *Of Tears and Smiles and Crocodiles* and donated all proceeds to her local chapter which she serves as president. A former elementary school teacher, Ruth now enjoys reading, bridge, golf, people and, most of all, writing words that rhyme while painting a picture or telling a story.



In 1987, she and her husband Herbert established an OCU endowment which enables students to spend summers in third-world countries working with World Neighbors. In 1991, she established an endowed scholarship in memory of her husband to assist in training young men and women for ordained ministry.

Connie Hubbell, GK, Topeka, Kansas, a member of the Kansas State Board of Education and its legislative coordinator, was elected president of the National Association of State Boards of Education. She will head the 650-member, not-forprofit organization serving state and territorial boards of education.



Bobbin Gay Crabbe, LD, Sacramento, California, was honored by the Tierra del Oro Scout Council for her work in music and drama for children. She was one of 5 women in the 16 county area selected as a role model for Girl Scouts in the World of Creative Arts. She has been active in children's theater over 20 years both in Sacramento and Pueblo, Colorado, with her recent work as director of the Sacramento Junior League's Children's Theatre. In February and March she directs 41 performances of musical plays playing to over 30,000 children each season. Children are bused into these free performances and for many it is their only chance to see live theater. The shows are all written by a college friend of over 50 years, Jean Kopf, and her musical director is Jane Cox. All three are in their 70s.

Edna Mae Burnam Nauman, GP, Sacramento, California, was honored as Woman of the Year for her life-long contribution to music and children by Delta Zeta, a national sorority with 178 college chapters and more than 350,000 alumnae, 500 of them in the Sacramento area.



Edna Mae publishes under her pen name of Edna Mae Burnam. Her career started after graduation from Chico State Teachers College when she wrote some fun songs and exercises for her young piano students. The first piece published was in 1935—The Clock That Stopped. Since that time she has had published over 150 works—piano course books, suites, duets, original sheet music for beginners through about the third level. Two of her best sellers are Dozen a Day and Step by Step.

*Dr. Suzanne Martin*, IB, Branson, Missouri, chairman of social and human sciences at the College of the Ozarks, was elected as the national chairman of the Dietetic Educators of Practitioners which is one of the many branches of the American Dietetic Association.



Mary Alice Rich, a charter member and past president of Chapter CV, Tucson, Arizona, was featured in a one-woman exhibit of her art in Tucson. The exhibit was held over to allow Arizona state officers and Tucson P.E.O.s to view this exhibit at the Founders' Day Luncheon. In March of 1992 Mary Alice was diagnosed with ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). She

She was pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Wenatchee, Washington, where she is a member of Chapter DZ.

In lieu of a dream trip to the Panama Canal, *Frances Krehbiel*, W, Clayton, New Mexico, and past state president of New Mexico, sent a \$2,500 check to the U.S. Department of the Treasury on Washington's birthday. ## Cover Artist

### Finding Beauty in the Eye of the Beholder

The flowers on the cover were designed by Pat Snodgrass, GP, Ft. Walton Beach, Florida, with beautiful pieces of free flowing kelp washed in from the Gulf of Mexico.

Since relocating ten years ago to a condominium which abuts a beautiful sugary beachfront of the Gulf of Mexico on Okaloosa Island in Fort Walton Beach, Florida, Pat's life has been consumed and enriched by treasures from the sea. Walking treks with her husband, Robert, usually offer moments of excitement in finding new bounty, or discovery as they enjoy their daily peaceful commune with nature. Having found over a hundred different species of shells, and maintaining an aquarium that has housed numerous fish and mollusks netted at the edge of the gulf, it was a treasureless day, so they thought, when, washing up to the tideline was an idea which would become a self-discovered art form—painting with seaweed! Her paints and brushes were right before her. All she needed was the paper.

As a native of coastal New England, Pat thought she knew seaweed. In 1956, she was taught how to preserve specimens on manila folders, at a science course for teachers at Harvard Summer School. But she had much to learn. When the Gulf opened up its beautiful paintbox, she found yellows and greens, pinks, reds, and purples, as well as browns and blacks—a veritable smorgasbord of color! The colors and textures were too beautiful to waste on manila cardboard. Working with seawater as a fixative, she learned to use the best quality watercolor paper for her artwork. No preservatives are used. After bouts of trial and error, creations much like Chinese brush paintings emerged. She called her designs "Gulfweed by Pat," and looks forward each year to entering her paintings in the local Arts and Design Society's Beaux Arts Exhibit.

For many years Pat thought she had developed a unique art form, but in June 1990, a friend sent her a clipping

from the *Boston Globe* showing an 81 year old Martha's Vineyard artist, Rose Treat, collecting seaweed. The caption read: "Making Art of Slime." The caption she received in November 1988 by Senior Lifestyle writer, Peggy May, in the *Northwest Florida Daily News*, was far more complimentary: "Naturally Beautiful Art: Area Artist Finds Grace in Gulfweed." As in any artistic endeavor, the beauty is in the eye of the beholder.

Summer and fall are the seasons for gulfweed. Last year, however, the Gulf was quite stingy supplying Pat with the weed. When pieces of kelp, as used on the cover, washed in, Pat felt they lent themselves to flower arrangements. Fortunately she had frozen some seaweed greenery to use when she needed to complete the design. \$\frac{1}{2}\$



#### Change in Tax Law for Charitable Gifts

A recent change in United States income tax law requires an individual donor to have a written acknowledgment from the donee organization to document any charitable gift of \$250 or more. This is effective for gifts made after January 1, 1994. A canceled check for such a gift will no longer be sufficient proof for Internal Revenue Service to allow a charitable deduction on income tax returns.

Because our five International Chapter educational projects and P.E.O. Foundation are qualified under U.S. tax law as charities, gifts from individual donors are deductible, if itemized, when calculating U.S. and state income taxes. Checks should be payable to the project or P.E.O. Foundation and forwarded through local and state treasurers to the International treasurer or to Cottey College for deposit according to instructions.

Upon our receipt of a donation for \$250 or more, the treasurer of International Chapter will prepare and mail to the donor an acknowledgment of the gift providing the information required by Internal Revenue to properly document the gift for income tax purposes.

**State Treasurers Please Note**—Checks from individuals for P.E.O. projects and P.E.O. Foundation should be processed within the same month received and forwarded to the International treasurer or Cottey College. This will allow timely deposit of checks as well as preparation of the required acknowledgments for donors.
