And everyone can show loving concern, grace and mercy—whatever it takes to make your chapter a wonderfully inviting place to be, in honor of our 7 founders. 2017!

To that end, I am encouraged with what I hear and see happening in this busy convention season—good, inspiring things are happening! I want to tell you a great story about a provincial convention I attended this spring—a provincial chapter **becoming what it is to become** and being excited about it.

In 2008, Alberta's 18 and Saskatchewan's three chapters merged to form the Alberta-Saskatchewan Provincial Chapter. This year the first board member, ever, from Saskatchewan, presided as president at the first convention, ever, held in Saskatchewan! The three Saskatchewan chapters—Moose Jaw, Regina and Saskatoon did a wonderful job hosting the convention. Sisters came some distance from Alberta in unexpected numbers to support this first effort. It was such an exciting time—record attendance and several "firsts." Plus, a new chapter received a charter, several chapters had impressive initiation numbers and two Scholar Awards were celebrated, along with a STAR Scholarship

and several other project recipients. They already have their 1 (new chapter) in the **"2 0 1 7"** goal and several chapters have their **2** initiates per year for both years of the biennium. They are on their way! I was so happy to be in Saskatoon and a part of this convention. I kept thinking, "This provincial chapter is 'becoming what



it is to become" and I am so proud of everyone concerned. More importantly, Alberta-Saskatchewan pride in their achievements was on display. It was a great P.E.O. experience!

If we are to be good stewards of what we have been given—the opportunity to be a part of this very meaningful, worthwhile organization that does so much to promote the welfare of women in all walks of life—we must be busy doing what we can do, not being deterred by what we can't do.

# New winemaker brings home first medal

Elisabeth Grunwald of Nicole Reese Wines won a silver medal at the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition

# Elisabeth Grunwald of Nicole Reese Wines followed her dreams.

Three years later, she won a silver medal for her 2013 Syrah at the 2016 San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition, one of the largest wine competitions in the world.

"It's all about the journey," says Grunwald.

With her children, Sierra-Nicole and Braedon-Reese, as her inspiration, Grunwald started Nicole Reese Wines in 2014. She made her first vintage in 2012, which was bottled and released in 2014. The second was made in 2013 and released two years later.

Grunwald started at the boutique level, making her own chardonnay and syrah. "They are two of my

favorites because I can enjoy them all year long, and they're classic wines."

Winning a medal was the farthest thing from Grunwald's mind as she grew her business and brand.

"I took a chance last fall and sent the two wines to the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition. It was random. I didn't tell anyone, not even my husband," says Grunwald.

"When I checked my email, I was in total shock. I reread it three times and then thought, 'Oh my gosh! This is for real!"

Her family was also elated by the news of her win. "It was great to show my kids there are successes in life when you work hard, and it motivated me to get out there even more."

Grunwald left the corporate world and a career in marketing behind. She relocated from Chicago to Southern Oregon in 2007 to pursue other interests.

"I decided it was time for a change and do something I was passionate about rather than go to an office every day."

Grunwald stumbled upon wine school and winemaking.

"I saw a brochure in the Valley View Winery tasting room for the Southern Oregon Wine Institute. I looked at it because I wasn't doing anything at the time, since we'd just moved to the area," explains Grunwald. "At first, I made a joke about it. Who goes to wine school? I took the brochure home and then thought this was a cool idea. I called Chris Lake, who's the director at the institute. He talked me right

into it. After 10 minutes, I was sold. I was going to wine school. It was the change in my life I needed."

Grunwald drove to Roseburg once a week for two years to study viticulture and enology at the Southern Oregon Wine Institute. She explored the vineyard and winery sides of the business and graduated in 2010. Grunwald decided the winery was a better fit for her, and from there she joined Pallet Wine Co. in 2011. She is currently an assistant winemaker but has done everything from bottling and processing fruit to lab work.

"I think it's important to encourage and help people as much as possible," explained Linda Donovan, a winemaker and founding partner of Pallet Wine Co. in Medford.

"I owe Linda a lot for being such a great mentor and providing me with the tools to be successful," says Grunwald.

"I was so proud she'd won," says Donovan. "Elisabeth has a young family and works hard. It's good to be recognized for having a great product, especially early in your career."

Growing up in the suburbs of Chicago, where the main sources of agriculture are wheat and corn, Grunwald wasn't exposed to the world of wine until she moved to Southern Oregon. "In Chicago, the goal was always to work in an office," she says.

But like many passions of an artisanal nature, Grunwald learned about food and cultural tastes as a young girl in the family kitchen.

"I cooked with my family," she says. "My mom and grandma taught me a lot in the kitchen, and my grandpa owned a butcher shop. I was exposed to different foods and had the opportunity to travel the world at a young age. I think this helped develop my palate."

"Wine is a great industry because everybody is happy and wants a life experience. That life experience comes together with wine. If you have good wine, you have friends," says Grunwald, smiling. "Winemaking in of itself is not glamorous, but I like a getting-your-hands-dirty job."

With wine currently in the barrel and new vintages such as a pinot

noir on the horizon, Grunwald isn't planning to slow down anytime soon. But even in the midst of growing her business, Grunwald wants to keep it intimate.

"I would love to open a small, quaint boutique. I appreciate the one-on-one aspect of my business. I like meeting new people, and more people, who enjoy my product," says Grunwald. "To me it's so exciting when you meet someone new and they think your wine is really good."

# 5 Successful Techniques to Recruit Others to Achieve Goals\*

Whether your goal is personal or P.E.O.-related, these useful leadership practices for recruiting and motivating will help to push your goal to success.

- **1.** Identify others who can help by asking yourself the following:
  - Who else cares about this goal? Who has passion, talents and strengths to help advance the goal?
  - Who builds team spirit and good collaboration?



- Who would benefit by being on a spirited team that makes a difference?
- Who would find this challenge a great way to grow and develop?
- **2.** Recruit others by naming their strengths. Paint a vivid picture of the positive experiences that they will enjoy and the differences they can make.
  - Describe how their specific efforts will advance the goal,



benefit another person, your chapter, a committee or board. Depending on the nature of the goal, the impact of their efforts may even extend P.E.O.'s shared mission of enriching the bonds of sisterhood and helping women across the world succeed.

3. Ask. "Will you...?" So many of us hesitate to ask. We might do the job ourselves instead of asking for assistance. We might say what needs doing, but stop short of asking directly for someone's help. We stand hopefully in silence and then wonder why no one steps up. Avoid imagining hundreds of reasons people might say "no" and letting your thinking stop you from asking; give people a chance to say "yes."

Your invitation might sound like this: "I know you're excited about supporting our P.E.O. philanthropies and you're really good at organizing people and projects. Will you consider pulling together our garage sale this year? Janet has volunteered the space already. Will you organize

the rest knowing we will dedicate the money to the projects?"

- **4.** Fuel their hope of success
  - Anticipate and address concerns.
  - Express your confidence in them throughout the journey.
  - Let them do the job without interfering.
  - Ask what help they want from you and support them as you are able.
- **5.** Celebrate successes, incremental and final. Appreciation, acknowledgment and connection are powerful benefits that engage and motivate volunteers. They also build volunteers' readiness to contribute in the future.

# P.E.O.: A Universe of Small World Connections

We've all heard and used the phrase "what a small world" to reference an unexpected connection, happenstance or coincidence with other persons or situations. "Small world" connections in P.E.O. seem to be common too.

Here is an almost unbelievable P.E.O. "small world" anecdote told by Miles Babb, son of Founder Alice Bird Babb, from one of his talks at a P.E.O. gathering. The date for this actual Chicago happening, described below, is unknown; one of Miles' last speaking events was at the 1960 convention of lowa State Chapter.

"Let me repeat a little story Clarence Stafford, son of Mary Allen Stafford, used to tell. It seems he and my brother Max had an appointment to meet in the lobby of the Congress Hotel in Chicago one winter's morning. Clarence was the

first to arrive and as he waited for Max to come he noted a lady sitting close by. This lady wore a puzzled expression and she also wore a P.E.O. pin. Finally she very timidly asked of Clarence some simple directional question.

"Clarence gave her the correct answer, then told her he noted she was a P.E.O. and that his own mother had been one of the Founders. Of course, the lady was pleased to know all this and soon they were engaged in conversation about P.E.O. in general. Just then Max came by.

"Well, Max was introduced as the son of another Founder. A look of suspicion crossed the lady's face and as I understand it, the introduction was acknowledged very coolly indeed. Knowing Max, as of course I did, I am sure he could and would have explained the coincidence to the lady's entire satisfaction had it not been for the fact that just at that moment, who should come bursting through the street door of the hotel but Dr. Charles Elliott, son of Franc Roads Elliott.

"Well, of course, Dr. Charlie was inducted into the circle and given the proper introduction as the son of a Founder. But this was one too many for the little lady. With a flash of her eye and toss of her head, she dashed out onto Michigan Avenue."

**Miles Thornton Babb** – (1879 – 1967) at his retirement, industrial sales manager for Illinois and northern Indiana for Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company; a Lincoln scholar; an attorney

**Clarence Stafford –** (1872 – 1950) in his business career in Chicago, president of Rathborne, Hair & Ridgway Company (manufacturer of corrugated and wood boxes); later moved to Montana and engaged in ranching and lumbering interests

**Dr. Charles Elliott –** (1873 – 1939) Professor of Medicine at Northwestern University, well-known researcher and diagnostician; member of the Medical Council of the United States' Veterans' Bureau

complexities and interworkings of different payer models of healthcare. Just six months later, during the second half of her sophomore year, Lauren spent a semester participating in ecological fieldwork courses in Northern Australia. She studied rainforest ecology, marine biology and aboriginal anthropology. Additionally, she

conducted an independent project assessing the utility and viability of wildlife rehabilitation at the Australian Wildlife Hospital which functions in cooperation with the Australia Zoo.

After returning from her time abroad, Lauren completed her required coursework while participating in a cellular microbiology lab studying tumor progression of breast cancer. She worked on this project during the last two years of her time at Elmhurst College. This work resulted in two journal publications and a poster presentation at a national conference.

In 2011, Lauren graduated magna cum laude from Elmhurst College. Following graduation, she moved to Northern Thailand to fulfill a Fulbright Scholarship during which she spent a year teaching English to roughly 700 Thai students each week at a very rural village school. Her students ranged in age from 11-19. While teaching kept her very busy, she was able to focus on her artwork after hours. Over the year, Lauren created a collection of anatomically themed artwork that was exhibited in Bangkok at the end of the grant period. She was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to display her artwork alongside that of many prominent and talented Thai artists. Lauren has continued to work with the Thai population, leading groups of 15-20 American high school students on six-week community service based cultural immersion trips for two summers during her first years of medical school.

Lauren has been very fortunate to have enjoyed such opportunities and greatly appreciates the support of P.E.O.

# An IPS Recipient's Story of Survival and Forgiveness

The downing of an airplane killing Burundian president Cyprien Ntaryamira on April 6, 1994, sparked the genocide of nearly 800,000 Tutsi, estimated to be 20 percent of Rwanda's entire population and nearly 70 percent of the Tutsi. You can imagine this carnage has had a lasting and profound impact on Rwanda and its neighboring countries including:

- A spike in HIV infection resulting from war rape
- Loss of infrastructure
- Economy crippled by severe depopulation

The emerging government struggled to establish a stable economy causing many to flee to neighboring countries for survival.

Enathe's Hasabwamariya's family spent three days hiding in the bush and tea plantations before they were captured and held in a house, which was subsequently burned. Of the nine

children in her family, only Enathe, then four, and her sister survived. The two sisters lived in refugee camps and later an orphanage for five years. As the orphanages were closed, they went to live with their grandmother and

began living a "normal" life.

Enathe embraced the opportunities provided her, excelled in school and received a scholarship for undergraduate

work at the University of Rwanda to study biology. Today, with the help of an International Peace Scholarship (IPS) she is in the environmental studies master's program at Antioch University, with a focus on conservation biology.

When she returns, she will focus on the conservation of chimpanzee habitats in Rwanda. This is important work as chimpanzees are a main source of tourist income for Rwanda and conservation will ensure their survival.

Rwanda continues to heal through efforts of reconciliation between the Tutsi and Hutu factions of the country. Forgiveness is a powerful goal but difficult to accomplish. Can you imagine asking survivors to forgive their perpetrators countrywide? Enathe commemorated the 22<sup>nd</sup> year since the genocide against the Tutsi with a gathering of friends and schoolmates on campus. She shared her story of survival and together

they watched the documentary "As We Forgive" promoting reconciliation among her countrymen.

Enathe shares, "I wanted to take this moment to say thank you and the whole P.E.O. for your incredible support...Giving education is the best form of love and support anyone can show. Through your kindness and love, I saw hope and love among humanity, I used to be scared of humans because of what they did to me and my family during 1994 genocide... but you showed me that despite all hatred in this world, there are people of good heart...Twenty-two years ago. I should have died because of who I am...You have showed me that we are all one and that I believe in a peaceful world. I want you to help me spread this message to all P.E.O. chapters that I am now happy and have hope for the future because of their support."

We wish Enathe a long and happy life and success in the goals she pursues.

Confronting Challenge with Resilience

Ask Dianna Skelly about her educational and career goals and she will reply, "I want to make things better before bad things happen." The bad things would be the after-effects of an earthquake disaster along the Cascadia Fault in the Pacific Northwest. No one knows the timeframe for such a catastrophic event, however past history of the fault shows one occurs about every 300 years. It has been 305 years since the last event. The good things refer to activities and events that build resilient communities enabling them to recover from an earthquake popularly referred to in the Northwest as "the big one." Talking with Dianna is fascinating and could be absolutely scary were it not for the confidence she exudes in guiding one to take action and be personally prepared. Dianna's belief in the inevitability of an earthquake disaster, based on scientific evidence, is sincere and absolute and she believes humans can prepare for such an event.

Dianna has served in several volunteer capacities including: vendor coordinator for the Eugene Disaster Relief Trials 2015; contributor to the City of Cottage Grove's Emergency Operations and Natural Hazard Mitigation plans; and chairman of the Membership and Marketing Committee for the Oregon Emergency Management Association. With assistance from a PCE grant Dianna graduated with a master's degree in community and regional planning in June. 2016. Dianna believes her master's degree work, coupled with her undergraduate degree, and

her volunteer work on local preparedness committees, has prepared her for work with state, county and local agencies to contribute to an infrastructure of government that will make Oregon communities capable of recovery. She is currently an emergency management assistant for Samaritan Health Services in Corvallis, Oregon, which includes five hospitals, 110 clinics and a geographic area that stretches from the Oregon coast to the Cascade Mountains.

Dianna prepared for a career that will enable her to support her family as a single parent with the same fiscal prudence she used to calculate how she would fund the two-vear commitment to earn her master's degree. Dianna and her two children rented a house close to the University of Oregon. Without a vehicle she traveled to school, errands and internship assignments by bicycle or bus. Her determination was fueled by her passion for this field and concern for her home state. Oregon does not have the same culture of preparedness as other states which face natural disasters far more often.

Before 2012 Oregon was not considered at risk in a Cascadia Fault event, but then scientific consensus changed to recognize the substantial risk. In her view governmental legislation is necessary to steer state, county and local governments toward a coordinated plan to network all emergency services. Corporations and businesses are also responding to emergency preparedness concerns

by providing essential services and developing emergency response plans to restore critical operations for customers, assets and employees in the face of a disaster.

Dianna is ready to contribute her passion and knowledge in the emergency management field by helping to develop civic plans for resilience in the face of a catastrophic earthquake and/or tsunami along the Cascadia Fault. She will address these challenges with the same attitude with which she faced a mid-life return to college as a single parent. "There is no quit. There is no this is too hard. I will do this!"

A happy footnote to this story of challenge and resilience is Dianna's initiation into Chapter FZ in March, 2016. She has graciously provided emergency preparedness training to her chapter sisters.

# Celebrating Laureate Chapter Success

The P.E.O. Scholar Awards project is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year and is concomitantly marking the 5th anniversary of the Scholar Awards Laureate Program. Local chapters can qualify as a Laureate chapter in two ways:

- A chapter that has nominated a successful Scholar will automatically be designated as a Laureate Chapter for the year of selection.
- A chapter that makes a lump sum contribution of \$500 or more through their normal process will be designated as a Laureate Chapter, based on contributions received by the end of February each year.

This year more than 700 local chapters made contributions that qualified for Laureate Status—a record number of chapters!

Chapter K of Newton, Massachusetts, has qualified for Laureate status by making lump sum contributions of \$500 or more **six times** since the program was established, the current record. Chapter K president Linda Harding says that the chapter is proud of their history of strong support of all the projects, including the Scholar Awards. Chapter K member Charlotte Harrington has a successful P.E.O. B&B that is a primary fundraiser for the chapter.



Scholar Kerri Seger invited members of Chapter UD to attend the defense of her doctorate dissertation at Scripps Institute of Oceanography. President Jauhree Walker says, "It truly is a wonderful opportunity to provide funds to such worthwhile research by outstanding gifted young women."

lowa City, lowa, co-wrote "Mary and Me: A Lasting Link Through Ink" a book that explores the 30-year friendship between two women: one who had never learned




to cultivate female friendships, and



After completing an undergraduate degree at Lenoir-Rhyne University and becoming licensed to teach, she earned a Master of Arts degree in English from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and worked as both a high school teacher and college instructor.

#### Anne Becker, MW, Saint Charles,

Illinois, created "Creative Cole Book" in honor of Cole Spiegel, the son and grandson of two of Anne's P.E.O. sisters. Cole was recuperating at Lurie's Children's Hospital of



Chicago—a hospital that cares for children with very serious illnesses.

illustrated the children's book "Samson's Gift." A Christmas story for any season, "Samson's Gift"



is the story of Samson, an orphaned lamb with an extraordinary coat of wool. Samson is a happy lamb who grows into a strong and handsome Merino ram but he can't bear to part with his beautiful coat of wool—that is, until one star-lit night. Ellen's

neo-impressionistic watercolor and acrylic paintings grace the pages of the book, which also includes a glossary of facts about sheep.

"Samson's Gift" won the 2015 Gold Illumination award for excellence in Christian Literature for the Gift/ Keepsake and Specialty Bible category.

Ellen graduated from Minnesota State University-Moorhead with a B.F.A. in fine art and a B.A. in art education.

# Pat Breidenbach, J, Mitchell, South Dakota,

wrote "The Jacobsen Family, 1770-2014: The Ancestors and Descendants of Henry and Mabel (Wilkins) Jacobsen of Castle Rock, South Dakota."



The family history of 596 pages and over 700 photos and documents of all kind deals primarily with the life of Pat's paternal grandfather Henry, who left his native Hamburg, Germany, in May 1889 as a 10-year-old stowaway on a ship bound for America. When a teenager, he made his way from Brooklyn, New York, to Nebraska, where he worked on a cattle ranch and then ran a confectionary store before taking a job in Chicago at age 19. In Chicago he also studied voice and piano at the Bush Temple Conservatory of Music.

After marrying Mabel Wilkins of Saint Joseph, Missouri, and becoming the father of two sons, Henry went to homestead at Castle Rock located north of the Black Hills of South Dakota. The family history continues with Henry's establishing a ranch, a post office, a country store with gas station, a community hall and a newspaper. Excerpts from his news columns of 1914-1928 provide details regarding the challenges of homesteading and building community, which later prompted him to enter politics.

Pat, a home economics education major, taught one year before becoming a stay-at-home mom until her daughter started college. She is now retired from a 20-year career as archivist for the Dakotas Conference of the United Methodist Church. She and her BIL George enjoy being grandparents and traveling. They live in Mitchell, South Dakota.

#### E. Marie Oberle, BM, Sarasota,

Florida, wrote her memoir "Outhouse to Penthouse: Discovering Courage Within." This deeply personal story spans eight decades and tells the story of Marie's



journey, starting with her feedsack-dress childhood in rural Kentucky during the 1930s. Marie recounts her transformation from a traumatized child and insecure young bride to a high-achieving educator and powerful woman who earned her doctorate degree while fulfilling her roles as a devoted wife and mother. Marie calls the book a celebration of her life, a salute to strong women and a love letter and legacy for her family.

Marie is now retired and lives on Siesta Key, Florida. She lost her husband and soul mate in 2011 to pancreatic cancer. Most important to Marie is her faith, her two children and her four grandchildren.

# The Cloud

There is a never-ending stream of buzzwords in technologybig data, the Internet of Things and net neutrality are just a few that have made waves in the past year. But one has been around for a while and yet still remains an elusive concept: the cloud.

#### What is it?

The cloud allows you to access programs and data from any computer or device with an internet connection. This can mean data storage, like DropBox or Apple's iCloud, or it can mean document applications like Google Drive or

Microsoft's SharePoint. The main benefit of the cloud is convenience you can log in to an account on any device, in any location, and be able to access your files.

#### How does it work?

Cloud storage companies have data centers with servers connected to the internet. When a user uploads a file through a browser or an app or makes a change to an application, that information goes to the data server, which records it. When the user wants to retrieve the file or information, it is sent back from the server to the user.

#### What are some examples?

The cloud is more prevalent than you think. Web-based email providers like Gmail and Yahoo are cloud-based because they run through a browser. Photo services like Flickr and Picasa conveniently store images.

#### Is storing information in the cloud safe?

Almost all cloud-based services are, at the very least, username and password protected, and many have additional forms of security built in. As always, do some research and use your best judgment.
