
I was a freshman in college when I received my invitation to membership. At that time, five women who knew me well believed I had the potential to become a P.E.O. I trust I have not disappointed.

promoting educational opportunities for women. Our sisterhood proudly makes a difference in women's lives with six philanthropies that include Cottey College, a women's college with two- and selected four-year programs, and five programs that provide higher educational assistance: P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund, P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship Fund, P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education, P.E.O. Scholar Awards and P.E.O. STAR Scholarship. P.E.O. is headquartered in Des Moines, Iowa.



### P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund

Educational Loan Fund (ELF) is a revolving loan fund established in 1907 to lend money to qualified women students to assist them in securing a higher education.



### P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship

P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship (IPS) Fund was established in 1949 to provide scholarships for international women students to pursue graduate study in the United States and Canada.



### P.E.O. Scholar Awards

P.E.O. Scholar Awards (PSA) was established in 1991 to provide substantial merit-based awards for women of the United States and Canada who are pursuing a doctoral level degree at an accredited college or university.

### P.E.O. STAR Scholarship

The P.E.O. STAR Scholarship was established in 2009 to provide scholarships for exceptional high school senior women to attend an accredited postsecondary educational institution in the United States or Canada in the next academic year.



### P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education

P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education (PCE) was established in 1973 to provide need-based grants to women in the United States and Canada whose education has been interrupted and who find it necessary to return to school to support themselves and/or their families.



### **Cottey College**

Cottey College is a fully-accredited private residential liberal arts and sciences college for women in Nevada, Missouri, with two-year and selected four-year programs. It has been owned and supported by the P.E.O. Sisterhood since 1927.

**Individual donors may make** tax-deductible gifts to the above mentioned projects or through the P.E.O. Foundation. Checks should be made payable to the project or the P.E.O. Foundation and sent directly to the P.E.O. Executive Office. Donations may also be made online through the website peointernational.org. Look for the "Giving Opportunities" link on the home page.

All P.E.O. chapters are classified by the United States Internal Revenue Service as exempt from Federal income tax, but they are not Section 501(c)(3) charities. Consequently, contributions to P.E.O. chapters are not deductible as charitable contributions for Federal income tax purposes.

**P.E.O. is a philanthropic organization** where women celebrate the advancement of women; educate women through scholarships, grants, awards, loans and stewardship of Cottey College; and motivate women to achieve their highest aspirations.

### More Than a Little Horse Sense Meet Wendy Gentry, Chapter AE, Monroe, Louisiana

The first thing most people notice when they meet Wendy Gentry is her size. At barely 5' tall and weighing less than 100 pounds, it is easy—at first—to underestimate her. That would be a mistake.

Though small in stature, Wendy is a dynamo of energy. She devotes her time to those she loves—her family, her church, her horses and P.E.O. Wendy was initiated in 2007 into Chapter AE, Monroe, Louisiana, the same chapter her mother-in-law, Barbara Gentry, had joined years before. When Barbara experienced a terminal illness, Wendy noticed the attentiveness of Barbara's P.E.O. sisters. That made joining Chapter AE even more meaningful when her invitation came years later.

Volunteering for others is second nature to Wendy. Since her high school days, she has found ways to serve. "Stewart and I have always felt that our first and most important job was to rear productive, self-motivated, community-minded adults," she says. By example, they have instilled the importance of family and community involvement in their children.

Today Wendy is a successful horse breeder and trainer who has found some novel ways to incorporate her love of horses with her desire to serve. Early on, she used horses to create a special bond with her daughter in competitions. By training, grooming and showing their jumpers together, the two shared many happy times.

A singular focus throughout Wendy's life has been her love for horses. "I think that 'horse' must have been my first word," she laughingly says. She briefly majored in equine science at Louisiana Tech, but changed to business/marketing when she realized that she wanted to have her own business and horses rather than work for others.

unique home with attached stable nestled in the rolling hills of Ouachita Parish. Designed by Wendy and built by Stewart, the ranch is also home to six horses, two donkeys and three rescue dogs. Surrounded by woodlands and pastures, the site also features a regulation riding arena in which Wendy can train her horses.

Shortly after moving in, Wendy and Stewart hosted Chapter AE's old-fashioned barbeque auction. Arriving guests were greeted by the stable pups at sunset. The horses and donkeys pressed against the pasture fencing, curious about who was "borrowing" their stable for the night. Daisy-topped tables draped in white linen were set in the stable with the barbeque buffet just a step away inside the adjoining main house. Because of their hospitality, the Gentrys helped Chapter AE exceed their fundraising goals for that event.

Several years ago, Wendy began training with the Ouachita Parish Sheriff's Mounted Patrol. She was training a colt at the time and thought this experience might help desensitize the animal. Impressed with the work that these experienced horsemen did, Wendy applied to become a member of the reserve unit. After undergoing rigorous training in tactical defense and firearms for herself as well as

training for her horse, Wendy was sworn in as a Reserve Deputy with the Ouachita Parish Sheriff's Office Mounted Patrol Unit.


For hobbies, Joanne loves to keep busy and is also a volunteer on her condo board. She loves to read, cook, do crafts and go to her trailer park in the summer.

P.E.O.s know that the loving support of their sisters can make a world of difference when faced with hardship and tragedy. Recently, many of our members were affected by the destruction of Hurricane Sandy as it swept up the east coast. Following are two stories that exemplify the true meaning of sisterhood as P.E.O.s near and far reached out to help these sisters in their time of need.

### Massapequa, New York

Hurricane Sandy had a great impact on many sisters of Chapter F in Massapequa, New York. Out of our 29 members, only one made it through with no damage or power outage. Members closest to the water received the greatest devastation.

After many days, as power was restored, I was blessed to be the recipient of correspondence from P.E.O. sisters. Our New York State Board sent emails of concern and shared our emails with others. Long Island chapters sent their concerns and offered help; we heard from Chapter T, Schenectady, and Chapter CH, Long Island, offering us respite in their B&Bs. Our upstate sisters from Chapter BH, Oneonta, sent \$400 worth of gift cards that were disbursed to members trying to rebuild.

One morning I was sitting contemplating this disaster when my phone rang. It was a P.E.O. sister, Judy Anderly, president of Chapter NX, Sacramento, California. She told me of their concern for our chapter and that they wanted to adopt Chapter F as their Christmas project! We chatted for a long time and have since shared many emails and phone conversations about P.E.O., life and family. I can honestly say Judy has become a treasured friend. Just before Christmas I received a check in the mail from Chapter NX for \$1,000! I called Judy and we discussed how the money would be used.

### Fairfield, Connecticut

In October 2012, Fairfield, Connecticut, was hit by Hurricane Sandy. It was estimated that 95 percent of the town was without power and heat—some for more than a week. Within a five-mile radius of Fairfield's beach area, homes were flooded; there were mandatory evacuations and the National Guard was called in. People who wanted to see their homes had to canoe or kayak down streets and when they got there, they simply saw devastation.

Fairfield P.E.O. Chapter H member Janet Wahnquist and her husband Harvey lived within a mile of Fairfield's Penfield Beach. Their home was one that was hit hard. They were told it was unlivable and would have to be totally redone. They were also told that in order to start the process they

needed to have everything out of their house within 24 hours.

How do you remove all damaged items, save anything that wasn't ruined, get it all out of your house and also find a place to live within 24 hours? You make one phone call and send out one email to your P.E.O. sisters.

The Saturday after the storm, at 11 a.m., Janet enlisted the help of P.E.O. Judy Nessel who got the word out to all their other sisters. By 1 p.m., Janet and Harvey had a mini army helping them at their house—there were Chapter H sisters, BlLs, sisters from other Fairfield chapters and some of their kids—all pitching in to lend a hand. Janet met each and every person who came to help with a huge smile and hug and said, "It's all just stuff. You people are what matters and I'm so appreciative."

With all the help, it only took three hours to get the house cleaned out and ready for construction. It was a tribute to being ready to help a sister in need at any time. At the next P.E.O. meeting a few weeks later, Janet said they were underway with construction which would take six months. As she started to get choked up she repeated what she had said on that post-storm Saturday—that it's all just stuff and they'll be okay. She also said she was overwhelmed by the tremendous outpouring of help from all her sisters and she thanked us all.

Janet and the rest of Fairfield are on the road to rebuilding, but this is just one wonderful example of how truly amazing our P.E.O. sisterhood is, especially when we need each other most.

# Nora Janik's Hollywood Nora Janik's

P.E.O. Nora Martin Janik, A, Portland, Oregon, says, "I love raising money. No matter what organization I've belonged to—PTA, American Cancer Society, March of Dimes or P.E.O.—raising money is what I love to do…in 1944, when I was 19, I helped raise \$47,000,000 for U.S. War Bonds during a 24-hour radio fundraiser in San Francisco."

Nora, now 91, fondly recalls her life in Hollywood during WWII. She began her career as a western singer in a group called Pals of the Golden West. Nora and the Pals performed in more than eight movies with Gene Autry and Roy Rogers and had a command performance before Martha and the Crown Prince (now King of Norway) Olaf, where Nora was awarded a special pin which she treasures to this day.

When WWII started, the Pals of the Golden West were all drafted while Nora went on to have a successful career as a singer on her own.


Eddie Cantor, a popular radio personality of the era, signed her for five years on his show "It's Time to Smile." He and Nora spent time each year entertaining U.S. troops and touring hospitals, service camps and mess halls. They held fundraisers along with several famous stars of the day including Kate Smith, Bing Crosby and Pat O'Conner.

Nora worked with other stars in the famous Hollywood Canteen, a place where troops came to relax and be entertained during shore leave. Nora and Eddie Cantor are seen in a segment of the movie "Hollywood Canteen," which Nora says is a very true representation of what the establishment was like. Nora says about that period of her life, "It's almost magical to think that a little nobody from Portland, Oregon, was on stage with the likes of Kate Smith, Loretta Young, John Wayne and Bette Davis—and we were all working together for the war effort."

After the war, Nora returned to Portland where she married and had children. She continued to volunteer for many worthy causes, including P.E.O., which she joined in 1987.

For many years, the large disks on which many of Nora's songs were recorded lay stacked in a closet. With the help of a new technology and the diligence of a dear friend, Nora's recordings were recently transferred onto CDs. The result is an album called "Nora Martin Sings"—the proceeds of which Nora has given to P.E.O.

Nora visits P.E.O. chapters in her area, sharing her story of those early Hollywood years where she sang with well-known orchestras of the time such as those led by Paul Whitman, David Rose and Mark Warner. She also sang with renowned guitar innovator Les Paul in the days when his studio was in his garage. Ten songs on the CD are with Les Paul. Nora treasures these songs and her friendship with Les Paul.

Nora no longer sings in public but plays selections from her CD during her program, which features photos and memorabilia from those long ago days.

During her talk Nora also reveals a touching story about one visit with a young wounded soldier. She calls it the Eddie Curran story. Before entering a soldier's hospital room, Nora was told the condition of the soldier so she could be prepared for a brief conversation and a song. She was advised before entering his room that Eddie did not want to live. She approached him bravely and entered him into conversation asking where he lived, if he had a girl back home and she sang a couple of songs to him.

Eight months later Nora was performing at the Metropolitan Theatre in New York City when she was told by her manager that at a certain time during her performance she should introduce someone in the audience. Her manager had arranged for that someone to sit in the audience where a spotlight would reach him. That someone was Eddie Curran, who wanted to speak with Nora to thank her for saving his life by encouraging him to live. When Nora introduced Eddie, the entire audience rose to applaud this young, 19-year-old veteran of the U.S. Navy. Eddie served on the carrier Enterprise and was from Providence, Rhode Island.

It still brings tears to Nora's eyes when she talks about Eddie. She and

her manager took Eddie out for dinner. Weeks later she received a thank you note from Eddie and a gift of his Purple Heart. The note read, "To the Purple Heart Girl, a gallant G.I. performer." Nora's fondest wish is that she can return the Purple Heart to Eddie's family. So far that search for Eddie or Eddie's family has been unsuccessful.

Nora has some health issues but she has a remarkable memory and when she has a program to present, she draws strength from within, smiles and very graciously shares a chapter of her life from those Hollywood days.

And while I know that in 144 years I won't be receiving a letter from a college student thanking me for founding a sisterhood that numbers a quarter of a million women, I hope to use the educational opportunity I have been given to change my small part of the world for the better—just as you did. She is now traveling across the state working to implement the strategy by giving presentations on the research and benefits of incorporating the

surveys and assisting districts with implementation.



### A Message from the Cottey President

Every institution of higher education must be accredited by a regional accreditation association to verify the quality of the



educational program offered.
Cottey hosted a highly successful
accreditation visit from the
Higher Learning Commission.
I am pleased to tell you that Cottey
was reaccredited for 10 years.

The team especially noted the commitment of the College and our constituencies to our mission to educate women. The report recognizes evidence that this mission is embraced enthusiastically by all stakeholders. The team acknowledged that Cottey is a "teaching" College, noting effective, innovative teaching and faculty-student interactions. These are attributes that we all know are at the core of the Cottey experience.

Cottey was also approved to offer our fifth major, a Bachelor of Arts in liberal arts. This new major allows the students flexibility in choosing an area of focus along with a common core of liberal arts requirements. According to Dr. Angela Firkus who wrote the proposal for the major, "A liberal arts degree provides a student with general knowledge and intellectual skill, rather than focused occupational or professional skills. A liberal arts major can develop skills for an occupation or profession through internship and service learning opportunities." Students who choose this major may prepare for a career in teaching, law, communications, management and others.

While these two announcements are certainly important steps forward for our College, the greatest stride toward developing an adequate array of Cottey majors is the visiting team's approval of "general authority" for Cottey to continue developing majors in fields in the humanities and the social sciences without preparing separate change applications and hosting a team for each new major.

This general authority will allow the College to move forward more quickly to address the needs and interests of our students and to use the strengths of our faculty. We will be able to make progress in adding four-year degrees in a much more timely manner.

These positive steps may not have been possible without the support flowing to the College from the Defining Moment campaign. The goals of this comprehensive campaign clearly undergird our growth in curriculum and faculty. We are in the final year of the five-year campaign. There are, in fact, only six months left to complete the campaign.

We have the momentum and the determination we need to complete the \$35 million dollar campaign successfully. However, we should not lose sight of the true purpose of our efforts, the education of women in a learning environment that is most conducive to their intellectual and personal development. Cottey is preparing women for future roles of leadership and influence. We are, indeed, a mission-driven college, and our mission is to educate women for leadership in a global society.



### **Technology Meets Tradition in Uruguay's Wool Industry**

With a background in graphic and industrial designs, Agustina Bello Decurnex is a textile and fashion designer, a teacher in Uruguay's Design School and an entrepreneur. She is also a 2012-13 International Peace Scholarship Fund recipient and a Fulbright fellow from Uruguay, now pursuing a Masters of Fine Arts at the Rhode Island School of Design.

Agustina's story begins during her childhood summers in remote Villa Serrana with her grandmother. Here, she learned to appreciate traditional textile arts. "During that time", she says, "I was the weird girl in school who enjoyed knitting with her grandmother as much as playing video games, but I was so passionate about it that no one ever made fun of me."

Agustina's vibrant words describe the Uruguayan wool industry: "In Uruguay the textile traditions have never stopped being sustainable, sheep never stopped living freely in the countryside and the lifestyle never lost pace with nature. The exuberant colors of our bulky wool yarns reflect these; they are kettle-dyed in the countryside and dried outside by the sun and the

wind. These hand processes give our yarns a unique color quality because of its subtle tonal changes. Uruguay's traditional knits take full advantage of the material and color features of our yarns. Knitters are exceptionally skilled and known for their intricate patterns."

For centuries Uruguay's wool industry provided work for women in the rural areas. However, with the advent of synthetic fibers and machine-produced products, this cottage industry is endangered. Reversing this trend is one goal of Agustina who hopes to maintain Uruguay's cultural traditions by incorporating handwork and modern processes. She plans to work with Uruguayan wool in traditional cable-crossed knitted patterns and incorporate advanced textile technologies. This will create a bond between traditional sustainable practices of Uruguay and contemporary technology, creating products that can compete in international markets. With her aspiration and vision, Uruguay's unique textile industry will move into the future, providing economic opportunities for the rural women of Uruguay.

### **PCE Grants Make the Difference**

Behind every PCE grant there is a story of challenge and determination. For the PCE trustees it is especially gratifying when we learn that a grant made the difference in enabling a recipient to realize her goal. As P.E.O.s we often say that when we educate a woman we educate a family, indeed a community. PCE truly lives up to that assertion as exemplified in this snapshot of three recent grant recipients showing a very real picture of the women whose lives can be affected by a PCE grant.

Jennifer Lucas was a young mother of three when she left an abusive relationship and drifted between temp jobs and low paying factory work until she realized the only way she could ever get ahead was through education. Jennifer enrolled in the community college and found a particular aptitude for electronics. Through her own assertive actions she gained a job as an electrician's helper while pursuing an associate's degree in electrical technology. With the assistance of a full PCE grant of \$3,000 and armed with her own persistence, Jennifer completed her course of study and is employed full time as an electrician with an electrical contractor in Mooreville, Mississippi.

**Christine Scheibelhut** was

a divorced mother of three, one of whom has special needs, requiring her to stay home to provide specialized care. Once all her children were enrolled in

school, Christine also returned to the classroom. She began an accredited bachelor's degree in social work, a program that would allow part of her student loan debt to be forgiven if she agreed to work in a challenged community upon degree completion. An ELF loan along with the \$3,000 PCE grant Christine received made the financial difference in her ability to finish her course of study spring term 2013 and begin her career in social work on the Iron Range near Duluth, Minnesota.

It is especially gratifying when we learn that a grant made the difference in enabling a recipient to realize her goal.

Reaching LaTonya Jackson's voice mail, you would hear this inspiring greeting: "I am an achiever. I was born to win. I will stick with it through thick and thin. I will press forward. I will never give in because I am an achiever and I was born to win!" Latonya is a vibrant young

woman, committed to motivating children of an impressionable

age. While working part time as a substitute teacher and tutor, LaTonya was also pursuing a master's degree in middle



# **Angel Groups Watch Over Project Recipients**

Chapter FJ, Sunriver, Oregon, is filled with "angels!" For many years our chapter has been supporting our chapter's sponsored project recipients. Over the years, the process has expanded into the Angel Group program. Some years, we've had as many as seven recipients of P.E.O. grants, loans or scholarships.

If possible, we also attend graduation. Keeping in touch is the key. The purpose of the Angel Groups is to reach out and be there for these women who are striving to improve their role in life.

## Forming an Angel Group in Your Chapter

Select a "head angel" and determine what her role will be. Likely it will include:

- Providing each student a list of her angel group with phone numbers, email and mailing addresses.
- Meeting with angels to decide who will send cards and gifts and when. Duties for sending cards and gifts can be split up as works best for the group.
- Sending email reminders to angels when it's their turn to send a card or gift; as the year rolls on, it could be forgotten that they signed up.
- Providing a schedule for each angel after the sign-up in case they want to trade duties.
   Students can receive a "thinking of you" card once a month or on the months other than a holiday month—the angel group can decide.

## Lynne Bodry Shuman, BH, Marietta, Ohio, has a new book,





## Sheila Ingle, D, Spartanburg, South Carolina, wrote "Fearless




Martha, A Daughter of the American Revolution," a fictionalized biography for young readers about Martha Bratton, a heroine who defies the British from her

# A P.E.O. YOU SHOULD KNOW

# Allison Bautista Chapter DT, DeLand, Florida Initiated: July 14, 2011



Allison Bautista is a senior at the University of Florida. Graduating in May with a degree in linguistics, she is on a pre-med track.

Last summer Allison spent nine weeks in Nancimi, Nicaragua, as an intern for the Foundation for Sustained Development. There she helped start a "casa materna"—a "maternal house," where pregnant women in the area can go a few weeks before they deliver their baby to receive proper care.

# What were your duties in Nicaragua?

Since I'm interested in health, I was assigned to work for a clinic and was tasked to develop a project based on the needs in the community. I interviewed patients, nurses and local citizens to determine what was needed—in our first community meeting we came up with the idea for a maternal house. Nancimi is a rural town situated in the mountains with many smaller, surrounding

communities. For patients from outlying communities to get to the health clinic (the only one in the area) to receive care, many of them have to walk or go by horse. Walking from the furthest community can take about three or four hours and there is a mountain one must hike over. In 2011, six infants died before and during birth because of complications that could have been avoided had a skilled birth attendant been present.

There was a house in Nancimi that wasn't being used. We cleaned it out, tore down walls and put in electricity, a kitchen and a latrine. I was in charge of fundraising and oversaw construction.

On the last full day I was there, we had an opening ceremony for the casa materna. It has all the comforts of home; it's a place where expectant mothers and their partners can come to spend time in the last week or two of the mother's final trimester.

There is an established group of people in the community to take care of patients who will utilize the casa materna services; I'm confident it will be supported by the locals.

# What are your plans for after graduation?

I hope to go to medical school eventually. I'm taking some time off between undergrad and med school. I've been accepted as an alternate for a Fulbright English Teaching Assistantship in South Korea, and applied for Teach for America. I've also applied for graduate schools at Tulane, the University of Michigan and Boston University; I want to get a master's degree in public health.

# How did you get involved with P.E.O.?

My mom and both my grandmothers are P.E.O.s. My mom, Sandra Bautista, is in my chapter, DT, DeLand, Florida. My paternal grandmother, Daisy Bautista, is in Chapter AK, Moberly, Missouri. My maternal grandmother, Ellen Richardson, was a member of Chapter BD, Salisbury, Missouri—she passed away about 10 years ago.

When we started the casa materna we were trying to decide what to name it—some people wanted to name it after me but I said no—I hadn't done it all by myself. Then I came up with the idea to name it after my late grandmother. So it's called Pueblo Indigena Nancimi Casa Materna Intercultural "Ellen Richardson."

# What do you like about being in P.E.O.?

I really enjoy all the women who are in P.E.O. I can't attend the meetings too often, but every time I do, I always really enjoy the company of all the women—they have such good hearts and are so spirited. They are really sweet and were so supportive when I was working in Nicaragua, even sending donations for the casa materna. I appreciate all the support I get from them even though I haven't been involved as much as I'd like to be.

# What do you like to do in your free time?

I enjoy the outdoors. I run a lot—I ran my first half marathon about a month ago. I also enjoy cooking, but most of my time these days is spent studying—I am taking the MCAT soon.
