



P.E.O. STAR Scholarship

The P.E.O. STAR Scholarship was established in 2009 to provide scholarships for exceptional high school senior women to attend an accredited postsecondary educational institution in the United States or Canada in the next academic year.



Cottey College

Cottey College is an independent, liberal arts and sciences college for women. Located in Nevada, Missouri, it has been owned and supported by the P.E.O. Sisterhood since 1927.

The Convocation to Organize Alaska State Chapter

During the weekend of September 24-25, P.E.O.s gathered from all over Alaska, the United States and Canada to celebrate the Convocation to Organize Alaska State Chapter. The event, hosted by the Executive Board of International Chapter and members of local Alaska chapters, was held at the beautiful Hotel Captain Cook—a historic, lovely and welcoming venue in the heart of Anchorage.

Celebrating P.E.O. in Alaska

On Saturday night, delegates and guests gathered for a beautiful banquet and program celebrating the history of P.E.O. in Alaska. Brenda J. Atchison, Second Vice President, International Chapter, welcomed all and set the stage for the evening's events.

Special recognition was given to Laura Storms Knapp who was the President of Supreme Chapter from 1949-1951. As organizer of Supreme Chapter, Laura was determined to organize chapters in Alaska. Women who had moved north with their families in the years leading up to and during the war had generated a nucleus of P.E.O. interest in both Ketchikan and Fairbanks, Laura embarked on the long and unpredictable journey to Alaska in August 1945. The intrepid sister went to Ketchikan, where she organized Chapter A, then left directly for Fairbanks and established Chapter B. Chapters A and B are referred to as the "twin chapters" and are rightly proud to have led the way for P.E.O. in Alaska. Laura's granddaughter, Marcia Knapp Haas, past president of Connecticut State Chapter, provided a video sharing information from her grandmother's journey to Alaska and her pivotal role in establishing our Sisterhood in the Last Frontier.

Lynne Krizek, Chapter B, and Donna Steinfort, Chapter Q, Co-Chairmen of the Convocation Committee, together with members of the Committee, presented an informative

and entertaining program about the organization of Alaska's 18 local chapters and the status of the remaining 17, which included a lovey musical interlude by the Ukeladies of Chapter Q. It was a joy to see photos from the past and hear stories of what was happening in Alaska during the years when each chapter was organized, as well as what they are currently doing to advance P.E.O. in Alaska. In addition, Lynne Krizek, Chapter B, compiled a booklet commemorating the history of each chapter. "The P.E.O. Sisterhood in Alaska – A History of Chapters 1945-2016" is not only a labor of love, but is a true keepsake to treasure.

Sunday's Business Meeting

The ballroom was full for the business meeting held on Sunday afternoon. Alaska's 17 chapters each sent two delegates for a total delegate voting strength of 34. Another 244 sisters were in attendance from all over the U.S. and Canada, including New York, Hawaii, North Carolina, California, Montana and Alberta-Saskatchewan, to represent 30 state/provinces/districts in total. The love in the room and the support for the sisters in the Last Frontier was amazing. Most Alaska P.E.O.s had never been in a room with more than 30 or 40 sisters so hearing the Opening Ode and the Objects and Aims recited by such a large group of sisters is not something they will soon forget.

The processional was led by the four Past Presidents of International Chapter in attendance—Nancy Ryan Jerdee, Barbara Andes, Susan Reese Sellers and Maria T. Baseggio. Members of the seven pre-convocation committees entered, followed by the International Chapter Executive Board.

The presiding officer, International Chapter Organizer Patricia L. Brolin-Ribi, welcomed everyone to the Convocation to Organize the Alaska State Chapter and said, "I want to be perfectly clear that it is only by happenstance that I am honored to be the one standing before you today as the presiding officer...I just

HAPPEN to be the one serving in the office of organizer of International Chapter at this particular time. That means that I stand on the shoulders of and owe a huge debt of gratitude to those who came before me—both as International Chapter officers and as Alaska members who have considered this step for oh-so-many-years.

"Please know that as we go forward today, as a team of P.E.O. sisters, I will try to do justice and honor to the privilege I am given...As you will hear throughout the day, there is much history to consider and to respect and to celebrate in this journey."

Past President of International Chapter Nancy Ryan Jerdee offered the invocation, which was especially significant as she was the Second Vice President of International Chapter at the time of the last state/provincial/ district Convocation—the Northeast District chapter, organized in 1990.

Reading of Dispensation

President of International Chapter Beth Ledbetter had the honor of reading the Dispensation that had been granted to organize Alaska State Chapter as was presented at the 2015 Convention of International Chapter. This important document allowed the Alaska local chapters to hold a convocation and begin organizing before receiving their official charter at the next Convention of International Chapter. Those who were in attendance in Indianapolis will remember that when the Dispensation was read by Maria T. Baseggio there was wild applause and joy for Alaska and for the entire Sisterhood.

Keynote Address/Counsel

During the keynote address, President Beth took the time to talk about the history surrounding the creation of this state chapter. It had been discussed for decades, but many Alaska sisters were not ready.

As Joelle Hall recalls, "Some from outside of Alaska may not understand the reticence of Alaska chapters to take this step. There were many considerations, but foremost amongst them were the distances that sisters would need to travel to fulfill the role and attend conventions. Fairbanks and Ketchikan are 1,559 miles apart—further apart than Bemidji, Minnesota, and San Antonio, Texas. There are no roads that connect these sisters. Travel is time-consuming and expensive. The concerns about cost, as well as other issues, stopped talk of a state chapter for years."

But in 2012 renewed interest was found. A group of Alaska sisters, some of whom were in favor of and some of whom had misgivings about a state chapter started working together, with guidance from International Officers, to begin a grassroots discussion again.

Conference calls, meetings and many frank and earnest discussions began to take root. Each chapter and sister had an opportunity to raise questions and concerns, issues were discussed, challenges were researched and addressed. In September of 2015

a vote was taken in each chapter in the state. The proposal to organize a state chapter passed with two-thirds of the chapters in favor. Alaska was to have state chapter. As Beth Ledbetter reported, it was "... a done deal. A done big deal." For the first time in 26 years P.E.O. would be establishing a new state chapter!

Presentation of Alaska State Chapter Quilt

President Beth's inspirational keynote was followed by the presentation of a

special quilt by members of Chapter R, Seward, Alaska. Chapter R was organized only one year ago and having missed most of the early discussion about forming a state chapter, these members wanted to be a part of the excitement. They took responsibility for assembling a quilt with blocks provided by the 17 local Alaska chapters to represent Alaska State Chapter. The quilt will be displayed at all future state conventions.

Reports of Committees

Each of the seven pre-convocation committee chairmen presented an oral report of her committee's work in preparation for the Convocation and for the inception of a state chapter. Untold hours of diligent research

and discussions resulted in solid recommendations for the delegates to consider. An additional presentation by the Membership Committee provided insights and suggestions for how to strengthen local chapters.

Golden Girls Luncheon and Project Highlights

The theme of history was constant throughout Convocation and that was especially true as 59 sisters were honored for being P.E.O.s for 50 or more years. Each of these sisters received a special pin, a gift from Chapter F, recognizing their years in P.E.O. Brief biographies were presented for the 22 of these wonderful sisters in attendance. Special thanks went to Judy Jasperson, Chapter I, for gathering and compiling a booklet of their biographies.

Sue Baker, First Vice President, International Chapter, introduced amazing presentations about the P.E.O. International Projects and local recipients of projects supported by P.E.O. These ladies spoke with zeal about education and their appreciation for P.E.O.'s financial and emotional support. It was certainly a touching reminder of how members, working together, can accomplish so much and make an impact!

Those moving presentations were followed by a presentation from Dr. Jann Weitzel, President of Cottey College, who gave an overview of all that is new at Cottey and a glimpse into the enthusiasm and passion that she has for Cottey, P.E.O. and for the mission of the college. She encouraged everyone to spread the word about Cottey.

Sunday Afternoon Session

On behalf of the International Chapter Executive Board, Patricia thanked all in attendance for their enthusiastic support for Alaska State Chapter. She said, "It is both gratifying and bittersweet for International Chapter to now turn over the joys, rewards and responsibilities of supervising Alaska local chapters to the new state chapter. But with much confidence

and faith in the capabilities of the new officers and committees to lead Alaska P.E.O.s forward, this transition will be a benefit for Alaska sisters, for the entire P.E.O. Sisterhood, and for the women helped to pursue educational opportunities."

Election and Installation of Officers

The Nominating Committee had done their work well and appreciated the 12 sisters who allowed their names to be considered for nomination. After much deliberation, the Committee nominated a slate of five members. The entire slate was elected unanimously as officers in the new state chapter.

President Beth, with her arm around each sister, installed them one by one in front a crowd of proud Alaska sisters. After each installation, a big hug and deep thanks from the International President sealed the deal. The new officers are:

In a loving gesture, Lynne de la Cruz, Chapter J, Hilo, Hawaii, presented leis to each of the new officers. This was especially poignant, given the close relationship sisters of Alaska and Hawaii chapters have had over the years.

Alaska Love Gifts

Alaska State Chapter sisters were stunned to receive more than \$8,000 in love gifts from P.E.O.s. When Kathy Soppe, Director of Finance/Treasurer, International Chapter, explained this unique concept of encouragement and support from fellow members and chapters and announced the amount to date, a gasp escaped the crowd and then a loud roar of thanks was heard from the assembled delegates and visitors. Alaskans were so touched by the support of their fellow sisters!

Invitation to the First Convention

In April 2017, the city of Kenai will host the first Alaska State Convention. To invite the sisters, four fisherwomen from Chapters M, P and R wearing hip waders, fishing vests and carrying fly rods stepped out in front of the crowd and began talking about the magnificent Kenai River while a "salmon" (a sister dressed in a sequin dress and fins) began to "swim" upstream to their rods and attempted to take the bait.

A Historic Event

Patricia Brolin-Ribi reflected on this historic Convocation event, "The entire weekend was uplifting, as we all experienced the virtues and loving spirit of P.E.O.! It was such a great team effort, with everyone working together not only to prepare for Convocation, but also for the inception of Alaska State Chapter. Great thanks to sisters from every Alaska chapter, the International Chapter Executive Board and executive office staff who worked together tirelessly to make this historic event a reality. The stars aligned for all the P.E.O.s in Alaska and the aurora borealis capped it off."

Sitting in her well-lit studio in the dark of a cold winter, the light of Heather's creative skills give a spark of genius. She slides her tools across a three-foot-thick piece of ice harvested from a pond near her home. An artistic idea takes shape after careful planning. After many hours of hard work, a beautiful ice sculpture radiates its beauty and clarity for everyone to behold.

Heather received her Bachelor of Arts degree in sculpture, bronze casting and mixed media and a minor in native arts at University of Alaska Fairbanks in 1992.

Heather has been a member of Chapter F, Fairbanks, Alaska, since 1997. She's been recording secretary for her chapter and her mother, Sally Ann Wells, is a member of Chapter DP in Beaverton, Oregon.

I once heard someone say, "Spirit, like the wind, cannot be seen but we can see the evidence of it." That thought was a constant in my mind as I stepped into the room for my first P.E.O. meeting.

There is so much that we do alone—caring for our children and aging parents, keeping house, dealing with our jobs and professions—that we can easily forget how strengthening it can be to come together with a large group of women to be infused with a dose of feminine energy.

Change drove me to reinvent myself. After the passing of my husband, and after my kids moved out to begin their own journeys in life, I too had to find my place in the world. I soon realized that the years I spent devoted to my family had left me isolated from a larger friendship base. Recognizing how important friendship is and how easily we can lose touch with friends inspired me to develop workshops about making friends and staying connected.

It was during one of those workshop events held at a library that I met P.E.O. member Gretchen Woeste. Following my presentation Gretchen told me that she enjoyed the program and asked if I would present the workshop to her P.E.O. chapter. I happily presented the "Five Essential Friendships" workshop for P.E.O. Chapter G members at their chapter meeting, and shortly after that Gretchen and P.E.O. members Kay Atman and Sue McAllister invited me to consider joining the organization. I jumped at the chance. Other than my church membership I had never held a membership in any organization.

Five months after becoming a P.E.O. member I was named a delegate to the state convention. My heart opened and swelled with pride as I watched and listened to woman after woman

take her place at the convention, raise awareness and reaffirm our mission of igniting a world of great possibilities for women through education, inspiration and strong shoulders to stand on.

I once felt uncomfortable about moving past my 50s. Growing up, I remember hearing my grandmother and her friends talking about how difficult growing old was. They would jokingly say things like, "Honey, don't get old," or "Aging isn't for sissies." They led me to believe that there might be something scary or creepy about the aging process.

Each P.E.O. woman has a beautifully inspiring and revitalizing story that reminds me that the older I get the more my own feminine spirit will come into fullness. As a P.E.O. member I have learned that sometimes a word, a sentence or a story can be just the thing to make all the difference in a person's life. Thank goodness Gretchen came to my friendship workshop that day.

I am grateful to Kay, Gretchen and Sue for introducing me to P.E.O. These women, along with all of my other P.E.O. sisters, their stories and their energy, are like the wind:

My grandmother and her friends are gone now, but I wish they could have met the women of all ages in P.E.O. and experienced the energy that explodes in the room when we are gathered for meetings.

Just listening to the many stories from my P.E.O. sisters has made a great difference in my life. I spent years feeling out of sorts after the loss of my husband. One day Gretchen told me how she too had lost her husband early in her life and had returned to school to become a teacher. Now retired, she shared stories of how she is now the "wise woman" to her grandchildren and how they look forward to spending time with her and her marvelous storytelling. What joy they have together! Now I too hope to become the wise woman to my grandchildren when they come.

Over a cup of coffee, Kay, now retired, told me all about her career as a researcher at the University of Pittsburgh. She talked about how important it is to help young women get a good education so that they can experience the boundless possibilities in the world.

I have been slowly working on writing a book on friendship. My P.E.O. sisters have inspired me to kick it up a few notches and get my book to the publisher by 2017. And shortly after my experience at the state convention I wrote the first of what are now monthly newsletters around friendship.

Quilts of Valor

Alana Losonsky, Al, Columbus, Georgia, recently honored a P.E.O. sister for her service in a combat zone. Alana presented a handmade quilt to U.S. Army 1st Lt. Olivia Moses for her service as a commander of a company of Army engineers in Afghanistan.

Alana is a volunteer in a nationwide program called Quilts of Valor, founded by Catherine Roberts of Seaford, Delaware. Catherine was inspired by her son Nathaniel's yearlong tour in Iraq. During his tour of duty she dreamed of the comfort a guilt would bring to a soldier in despair. She developed the guilt program to welcome home warriors with the love and gratitude they deserve.

Since 2003, Quilts of Valor has provided more than 90,000 guilts to combat veterans who have served in every war since World War II. Alana, a member of a local Quilts of Valor group, has distributed dozens of quilts over the past five years. She has made many quilts herself, but the one she picked out for Olivia was made by two women in Atlanta, Georgia, and is called Red Bars for Honor.

In a brief private ceremony, Alana explained the Quilts of Valor program to Olivia. "We want to honor soldiers and say thank you. We know freedom isn't free."

Olivia is a new initiate to Chapter AI, but is not new to P.E.O. Her mother, Patricia Nystrom is a P.E.O. in Chapter BR, Davidson, North Carolina, and her aunt Michele Ogden is a member of Chapter BW, Holland, Michigan.

Olivia graduated from Cottey College in 2007. She credits the leadership training at Cottey with giving her the confidence to make a big decision in 2010. Olivia was about to graduate from Western Carolina University with a degree in forensic anthropology,

when the Army recruited her to be an officer in mortuary services. "Cottey set me up for success," she said, so she accepted the offer.

Before Olivia graduated from Officer Candidate School, however, the Army told her the military no longer needed her in that specialty. She could have left the service with no penalty. Instead, she elected to complete her training and was assigned to the U.S. Army Engineers. In Afghanistan she commanded 130 soldiers, building roads and other infrastructure.

After her tour she was assigned to Fort Benning, near Columbus. Olivia was initiated into Chapter AI in January of this year, partly at the urging of her mother, who wanted her to be surrounded by "women of character." Olivia is now preparing for other adventures. She'll leave the Army to earn an advanced degree in the mental health field. She was married in April and moved with her husband to Amarillo, Texas, where she hopes to find another P.E.O. chapter with women of character.

What to Say to a Sister Considering Inactive Status

While we never want to hear a P.E.O. sister say "I am going inactive," it unfortunately can happen. What do you say to this sister, especially when you are caught off guard? Your response depends entirely upon how much she believes in the mission of P.E.O. and why she no longer wants to be a dues-paying member.

Look at this as an opportunity, even a gift. Your sister has opened a window for you to talk about her thoughts instead of her making the decision to go inactive silently, which would close the door on any chance to change her mind. Asking her why she is considering inactive status is your start. Really listening to her is the next best step because ultimately those words will take you in the direction of what to say.

Perhaps your sister tells you that she has become really busy with other commitments which prevent her from participating in P.E.O. meetings and activities. Remember, just because a member can't participate does not mean she should choose inactive status. By continuing to pay her dues, she is still supporting the mission of P.E.O. and the many project recipients whose lives are changed for the better because of P.E.O. She also retains her credentials to attend business meetings as she is able.

Which leads us to a follow-up question: "Does she still believe in the mission of P.E.O.?" If her answer is yes, then encourage her to remain active. If she no longer believes in the mission of P.E.O., perhaps something has happened to disillusion her. Responses from newly inactive sisters to an annual letter sent from the P.E.O. Executive Office indicate long business meetings and uninteresting

chapter programs are common reasons members choose inactive status. If your sister expresses one of these as a concern, other chapter sisters may feel the same way. Acknowledge her frustration and suggest the two of you work together to help your chapter adopt more efficient ways of doing chapter business and to infuse fun into programs and activities.

There is the chance that a conflict or difference of opinion has caused your sister to think she needs to step away from P.E.O. Do some active listening to see if you can help resolve conflict between members or challenge false or negative assumptions. Your willingness to advocate may result in clearing the air and, hopefully, a sister saved!

A flight delay and P.E.O. bag helped one P.E.O. sister discover a sister who had gone inactive by mistake. She was traveling a lot to take care of elderly parents and forgot to pay her dues. That's it, no disillusion, no conflict, just a task that was simply forgotten. The next mistake was that no one from her chapter called, emailed or sent a reminder. There might be a sister who needs an extra reminder so don't give up!

There is the chance that your sister has become financially stressed. While pride can keep this hidden, by listening you may discern that dues have become a burden. You might propose your chapter pay her International and state, provincial or district dues. While these dollars are relatively minimal, your sister likely needs the loving concern this simple action demonstrates.

While we hope we never have a sister tell us she wants to become inactive, **be proactive to keep her**

active. Regardless of your sister's reason for wanting to change her status, remind her that she didn't just join P.E.O., she became a P.E.O., and she'll always be your sister.

Do You Know These Membership Definitions?

Active: noun ac·tive \ 'ak-tiv\ A member who has paid her dues and has all privileges of the Sisterhood.

Inactive: noun in active \ (,) i-'nak-tiv\ A member who has forfeited the privileges offered in the business meetings of the Sisterhood by not paying her annual dues before March 1. An inactive member may be reinstated.

Nonparticipating: adjective non-par-tic-i-pat-ing \nän-pär-'ti-sə-,pV-ti<\ An active resident member who doesn't attend or participate in the life of the chapter.

Nonresident: noun

non·res·i·dent \ non-'re-zə-dənt, \ An active member who lives too far away to regularly attend her chapter's meetings.



P.E.O.s in the Spotlight

Heidi Williams, V, Fargo, North Dakota, was chosen as a 2015

MacArthur fellow for her work as an economist. Heidi works to unravel the causes and consequences of innovation in health care markets. She combines empirical observations and custom-designed data collection methods to build entirely new

datasets about technological changes in health care. In addition, her creative methods for determining causal inference and keen understanding of regulatory law, biological science and medical research have allowed her to trace the interplay among institutions, market behavior and public policy.

Heidi and her colleagues have investigated institutional factors affecting cancer drug development. Drugs that treat late-stage cancers take a shorter time to develop, test and bring to market than those for earlier stage cancers. Because patent protection begins at the time of filing, rather than when a drug is actually brought to market, late stage cancer drugs have a longer period of protection and offer more potential for profit. Their work provides compelling evidence that institutional factors such as the patent system create a bias against the development of drugs to treat early stage cancers.

Heidi received an A.B. (2003) from Dartmouth College, an M.Sc. (2004) from the University of Oxford, and a Ph.D (2010) from Harvard University. She has been affiliated with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology since 2011. Her articles have appeared in the Quarterly Journal of Economics, American Economic Review and Journal of Political Economy, among others.

Kathryn Bayne, X, Frederick, Maryland, current chairman of the

P.E.O. Scholar Awards Board of Trustees, was appointed executive director of the Association for Assessment and Accreditation of Laboratory Animal Care (AAALAC) International.

In this position, Kathryn will serve as the chief executive of AAALAC International,

headquartered in Frederick, Maryland. This includes overseeing the administration of AAALAC's offices in North America, Europe and Asia; supervising fiscal and personnel management for the association; providing oversight of AAALAC's Accreditation, Program Status Evaluation and Education & Outreach programs; and serving as AAALAC International's spokesperson.

"It has been an honor to have dedicated the last two decades of my professional career to AAALAC International," said Kathryn. "I believe in the mission and work of this organization and that it plays a vital role in ensuring high-quality animal care and high-quality scientific outcomes. I look forward to championing AAALAC's values around the world."

Prior to joining AAALAC International, Kathryn worked at the National Institutes of Health leading a research program on nonhuman primate psychological well-being and environmental enrichment programs for primates, dogs, cats and swine. She is a certified applied animal behaviorist and is internationally renowned for her work in laboratory animal behavior and welfare.



EDUCATIONAL LOAN FUND

Returned With Interest

The P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund (ELF) has made loans available to qualified women seeking higher education since its establishment in 1907. Over the years, interest rates for ELF loans have varied but the goal has been to set loan rates as low as possible to be considerably more competitive than rates available from other lending sources.

For many women, an application for an ELF loan is a first introduction to the P.E.O. Sisterhood. Sponsoring chapters interview, guide and support the candidates through the application process. A natural relationship develops between the chapter and the ELF recipient, often resulting in an invitation for membership. Applicants' personal statements frequently reflect gratitude and appreciation for their sponsoring chapters. It is not merely the monetary advantages of ELF which make it so significant as Michelle Carlson learned when she discovered P.E.O.


Michelle, XB, Sonora, California, returned to school at the age of 32. A single mother with two teenage daughters, Michelle determinedly completed her Associate of Arts degree in 2004 and then transferred to California State University (CSU) Stanislaus to attain a Bachelor of Arts in social sciences. Throughout those years of studies, Chapter TP, Sonora, California, supported her with mail, encouragement and holiday remembrances. With P.E.O. support Michelle received a P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education grant and applied for and was awarded the Mary Stuart Roger's scholarship at

CSU. Michelle writes, "To say the P.E.O. Sisterhood was interested in my education would be an understatement."

Michelle received an FLF loan while working on her California Multiple Subject Teaching Credential. With the help of that ELF loan, Michelle could remain at home in rural Sonora and student-teach locally while working full-time in a county behavioral health job. ELF support allowed her to continue to concentrate on family and to volunteer in the community. A fortuitous opportunity arose when she was asked to work as a full-time substitute teacher in a second grade classroom for her mentor teacher who was dealing with family health issues. In recognition

of her efforts at providing a seamless transition for her teacher, Delta Kappa Gamma honored her with the Outstanding Student Teacher Award.

Following graduation, Michelle began to repay her ELF loan, continuing to make monthly payments. With encouragement from Chapter TP, she began attending socials and meetings in Chapter XB, an evening chapter whose meeting time more easily accommodated her work schedule. Michelle's loan was repaid in full, the very same month she became a P.E.O., in 2013. She was able to share this joy with her grandmother and her mother who were the co-signers for her ELF loan. Michelle writes:

"I knew from the first time I met the Sisterhood at a brown bag luncheon, one day I would be a member." ELF's investment in Michelle ultimately resulted in huge dividends for Michelle and for P.E.O.!

After nearly nine years at her job, she now works in administration, currently as the Workforce Education and Training Coordinator at Tuolumne County Behavioral Health Center. A grandmother of three beautiful girls, she has served her chapter as an officer and this year became president of Chapter XB, serving with love and gratitude. As Michelle so articulately shared, "There are strings attached with P.E.O. monies; they are heart strings!"

Amber Todd:

Cottey Alumna and P.E.O. Sister

As a senior in high school, Amber Todd had never heard of Cottey College, nor did she know about the P.E.O. Sisterhood's support of women's education. By the time she graduated from Cottey two years later, Amber was a second-generation P.E.O.

It was Helen Kirby, a Cottey alumna, past president of Kansas State Chapter, and former chair of the Cottey College Board of Trustees, who after working on a project with Amber's mother, Debra Rosenberg, started Amber on her journey toward being an active member of the P.E.O. Sisterhood. While Amber and her mother both knew P.E.O. members in Great Bend, Kansas, it was not until Helen "really talked it up and encouraged me to visit campus" that Cottey landed on the list of colleges she was considering. "After seeing Cottey, other places didn't measure up," says Amber. "And the thing that impressed me the most was that the faculty members were at the visit event talking about their programs and already being invested in the prospective students and their futures."

Amber arrived at Cottey in Fall 2001. She describes Cottey as a "fantastic college," where she was ranked first in her class academically, was able to conduct undergraduate research in chemistry and made lifelong friends. She also discovered the sense of support that comes from P.E.O. ownership. It seemed that there were thousands of women encouraging her to pursue her dreams. The summer after she

graduated from Cottey, she was initiated into Chapter FS, Great Bend, Kansas, as her mother had been the year before. Debra is now a member of HR, Great Bend, Kansas. Amber is a member of AK, Dayton, Ohio.

Amber works as a postdoctoral research fellow and adjunct instructor in biological sciences at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio. In 2016, in addition to her research projects and teaching duties, she wrote three articles for refereed science education journals, and prepared three presentations for a conference on research in science teaching. At home, she and her husband, Jason, are raising two children—Amelia, 4, and Linus, 1. When they moved into their new home last summer. Amber added home decorating to her domestic research agenda, which also includes arts and crafts. preschool education and cooking. Amid all of these competing priorities, there is one more thing Amber makes sure she has time for: P.E.O.

"P.E.O. has helped me achieve balance in my life," says Amber. "When I moved to Ohio after I graduated from college, P.E.O. was a safety net of people for me." Having personally experienced the powerful support P.E.O. offers women, Amber actively participates. She has spoken at the Ohio state convention, served as

Paulina, a Ph.D. candidate at the University of Florida studying animal science, received her first IPS scholarship for the 2014-15 academic year. As a

child, she enjoyed spending summers on her grandparents' farm and as a teenager she loved camping and hiking. Paulina naturally developed an interest in natural resources and agriculture and following in her father's footsteps, became a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine. She is married with two young children, and strongly believes that women should be able to have a career and family simultaneously. Paulina loves teaching and maintains a position at the University of La Rioja while continuing her relationship with the Institute of Animal Reproduction Cordoba where she teaches graduate classes and participates in research. When she returns home, Paulina hopes to help Argentina protect its abundant natural resources by collaborating with qualified leaders in developing multidisciplinary policies.

While growing up during the tumultuous eleven-year civil war in Sierra Leone, Fredericka saw a trail of destruction that damaged its

infrastructure, healthcare and educational systems. Despite gender bias, preference for the rich and the lack of scientific laboratories. Fredericka, a female from a humble background, emerged trained as a medical doctor. She is now the IPS Jean Negus Mamo Named Scholar and is also a Fulbright scholar. Her mission is to tackle health problems at their source. Her experiences as a member of the World Health Organization's Ebola Response Team have brought her an awareness of nuances in public health. Fredericka hopes that her master's degree in public health from the University of Washington will help her better understand the prevention of infectious disease, the formulation of public policy and health economics. When she returns to Sierra Leone she plans to help change lives in her country by implementing improved health policies.

Yan Kwon Lau is persuing a Ph.D. in epidemiologic science at the University of Michigan. Before immigrating with her parents to South

Africa, Yan attended kindergarten in Shenzhen, China, and elementary school in Hong Kong. She received a degree in business science (quantitative management) from the University of Cape Town and moved to Japan as an exchange teacher. Living in Sendai at the time of an earthquake and tsunami, Yan witnessed terror and devastation. Coming from a nation where medical care was costly and under-resourced, she marveled at the benefits of Japan's national health insurance. Inspired to study public health, Yan returned to the University of Cape Town where she received a M.P.H. with a specialization in health economics. South Africa is currently formulating large scale health reforms and needs experts, Yan plans to be one of the experts who will facilitate improvement in health care for the people of South Africa.

Qiong (Joyce) Jia's Uncommon Journey

International Peace Scholarship (IPS) recipients rarely become P.E.O. sisters because they return to their home countries after their studies. Qiong (Joyce) Jia's journey is unusual and while it was not an easy one, we are so happy that our Hawaiian sisters offered her the gift of P.E.O.; we are proud to have her as a sister. Joyce's personal journey not only enriched her life in Hawaii but as she explains, will continue to influence her life when she returns to China.

In May 2006, as a student from China working on her master's thesis at the University of Hawaii, she was invited by Mendl Djunaidy, Associate Dean of the East West Center, to share her story with P.E.O. Chapter F, Honolulu, Hawaii. Joyce spoke to the chapter about her Tujia ethnic background, her family, leadership experience and how she was selected as a member of the International Fellowship by the Ford Foundation. Joyce says, "Accepting that invitation to speak was one of the wisest decisions I have ever made...it opened a door for me to know about P.E.O., a great organization for women helping women in the United States and Canada to reach for the stars with their educational dreams and goals."

After Joyce's talk, Ann Ayling, then-president of Chapter F, suggested that she apply for an IPS scholarship to support her Ph.D. studies. With Ann's help, Joyce became an IPS recipient for 2007-2008 and her scholarship was renewed in 2009-2010.

Joyce said that in addition to introducing her to P.E.O., Ann "also became a pillar for me and my

family in Hawaii." Joyce, along with her husband and son Jimmy, were included in holiday celebrations and events that included family and local P.E.O. chapters. What also surprised Joyce was how frequently she received cards and gifts from other P.E.O. chapters on the mainland.

Upon completing her Ph.D. field research in China on the equity and access to higher education for women in China, Joyce returned to Hawaii and was once again invited to speak at a local P.E.O. chapter—Chapter K, Honolulu. Following her presentation, then-chapter president Sally Parker asked Joyce if she would be interested in joining P.E.O. Joyce says, "I did not believe my ears" and accepted with "a big yes!" Her initiation, as she says changed her identity from "very grateful IPS scholar to, also a P.E.O. sister!"

Joyce credits Ann with helping her become an IPS scholar and Sally and the sisters of Chapter K for giving her the opportunity to experience P.E.O. as a sister. She says, "Both of them set great role models for me and demonstrated what it meant by women supporting women to achieve their highest aspirations in the real world."

While becoming a P.E.O. sister in 2012 was a high point, that year was also a difficult time for Joyce and her family. It started with a car accident in which she sustained a broken right clavicle, five fractured ribs and a punctured lung. Her P.E.O. sisters provided tremendous support by delivering meals, groceries, greeting cards and monetary gifts as well as taking her to doctor appointments and helping find an affordable replacement car. Joyce

credits her sisters' prayers and encouragement for helping her overcome her physical pain and psychological trauma. Her sisters were also with her when

her husband was diagnosed with a stage-3 kidney cancer later that year.

After a delay in her studies, P.E.O. sisters helped Joyce edit her dissertation and prepare for her oral defense. Joyce earned her Ph.D. in educational leadership and policy studies on May 13, 2013. Her post-graduate training ended in January 2016. Between 2013 and completing her studies, Joyce's husband returned to China for treatment, her son attended college in Boston and she remained in Hawaii writing a book on parenting. During this time Joyce was once again helped by Ann and her P.E.O. sisters who provided encouragement and support, including introducing her to a local publisher.

Joyce is grateful to P.E.O. for enriching her life during her time in Hawaii and believes that her P.E.O. experience will continue to influence her life when she returns to China to foster peace through education.



PROGRAM FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION

A Tale of Two Sisters: From Interview to Invitation

"I am filled with joy when I interview a student for a grant," says Sharan Aminy. "I have truly come full circle." Sharan met with Linda Rice and other members of Chapter AP, Berkeley, California, to tell her story and dreams for the future. And now as one of its members, she listens to hope-filled stories of others with similar needs and dreams. Robin Rollins, El Paso, Texas, has come full circle as well. This is a tale of two sisters, which began with an interview for a P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education (PCE) grant and led to an invitation to become a P.E.O. They have unique stories—one an immigrant to the United States and the other a veteran, but their quest for fulfilling careers to serve others is very similar.

Sharan's story begins in India where

she says, "My sisters and I grew up spending summer breaks performing community service such as distributing goods following a natural disaster. Mahatma Gandhi had a big influence. We learned the importance of giving back." Sharan's parents expected her to

attend college; however, she married an Afghan refugee and immigrated to the U.S. where her husband had been granted political asylum. Sharan became a U.S. citizen in 1988. She enrolled in college, taught English, cared for her family and worked two jobs to make ends meet. The PCE grant Sharan received in 2003 enabled her to finish a bachelor's degree in anthropology. Today Sharan is manager of 2-1-1 for Alameda County, California. 2-1-1 is a 24/7 phone line assisting callers with information and referrals to resources pertaining to health, housing and human services.

A few years after Sharan received her degree, Linda was both surprised and delighted to find Sharan behind a 2-1-1 information booth at a community fair. The two quickly reconnected and soon Sharan received an invitation to membership. She said "yes" and joined three other PCE grant recipients already members of the chapter. Today Sharan serves as the chapter's vice president and is a member of the PCE committee.

Robin Rollins' story begins in El Paso, Texas, with separation from the Army that left her homeless, all alone and with no savings. While living in shelters she found support and encouragement to attend college in nearby New Mexico and finish her degree in social work, which she had

started five years earlier. During a search for financial assistance, Robin discovered PCE. It was Chapter I, Las Cruses, New Mexico, that listened to her dreams for the future and was pleased to present a grant in 2006. Today Robin is employed as a social worker assisting the homeless at the Veterans Administration to secure employment.

"I always felt the need to give back to PCE," Robin said, "so I contacted the president of Chapter I, New Mexico, who told me it doesn't work that way. She said, 'There is no need to pay us back.'" So Robin presented the chapter with a donation to PCE. Chapter EH, El Paso, heard about Robin and soon she received an invitation to membership. Today Robin serves as her chapter's chaplain and is a member of their PCE committee.

Both Robin and Sharan express their appreciation for P.E.O. "My sisters are like my family, offering love and support," says Robin. "I will never forget the love and concern of a Chapter I sister who opened her home to me over Christmas when I was homeless." And Sharan cherishes the connection with women who feel like she does. "Educated women create a better community," she says. "It is important to keep growing, to uphold our ethical principles and reach for the highest standards possible. That is P.E.O."

P.E.O. SCHOLAR AWARDS

Scholar Award Recipient, Advocate for Women's Rights, New P.E.O. Member

While there are numerous examples of chapters that have introduced a Scholar Award recipient to membership in Ginger Feather P.E.O., the story of Ginger Feather and Chapter IR, Kansas City, Missouri, illustrates how a chapter member had scouting out potential project recipients in mind during a chance **conversation.** Chapter IR member Lori Allen's son attended the same school as Ginger's son. Lori and Ginger sat together at a football game watching their kids in the marching band; Lori took a moment to catch up with Ginger about the status of her studies. Ginger proceeded to share her

educational goals and information about her background. Lori says, "As I listened to her describe her work toward her doctorate, I was somehow reminded of a state P.E.O. meeting where I heard a Scholar Award recipient speak. Honestly, P.E.O. rarely crosses my mind at a high school football game, so I was so pleased that my chapter makes a strong point of discussing the importance of being on the lookout for potential scholars. They sometimes present themselves in rather unique situations—you just have to look for them!" After peppering Ginger with several more directed questions and getting the information she needed, Lori went home, did a little research and determined that Ginger was eligible for a Scholar Award. She then invited Ginger to come to the next Chapter IR meeting to describe her research.

Chapter IR president Nicki Barnes says of Ginger, "We were all so impressed and could have listened to her all night! She is just a delightful and warm, engaging person and so intelligent and driven! Ginger subsequently attended several more social hours at our meetings, and we were thrilled when Lori proposed her name."

Much to Chapter IR's delight, Ginger was selected as a 2015-2016 recipient of a P.E.O. Scholar Award. Her dissertation, titled "Women's Associations Democratize the Moroccan Family through Family Law and Penal Code Reform with Implications for National-Level Democratization" focuses on democratization within the family in predominantly-Muslim countries as a result of family law and penal code reforms, and the impact this micro-level dynamic has on democratization at the macro-level. Her biography can be found on the PSA webpage. Ginger recently accepted the case study researcher position for Morocco with the Women's Learning Partnership (WLP). This project is part of an 11-country survey of the relationship between discriminatory articles in family law and the perpetuation of violence against women (VAW). She will be in Morocco this fall interviewing and working with Moroccan women's

associations that deal with various aspects of VAW (e.g., domestic violence centers, centers that work with unwed mothers, women's rights associations and members of law enforcement and the judiciary). Following the case study, in January she will organize and lead a workshop in Morocco with women's associations and women's rights advocates to discuss her initial observations from the case study and the necessary processes and outcomes that are required to address these discriminatory laws and subsequent VAW. After the case studies conclude. WLP is launching a global campaign to pressure governments to change these discriminatory laws.

Chapter IR was excited to initiate Ginger on September 2, 2015. Nicki notes, "In spite of being incredibly busy between her studies, her field work and her young family, [Ginger] has jumped right into P.E.O. chapter life, coming to meetings whenever possible. She has already hosted a meeting, and she is currently chairman of the P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship Fund." Clearly, Ginger is doing great things for women across the globe, and inviting her to become a P.E.O. is a fitting extension of that work.

Introducing P.E.O.'s Enhanced Online Submission Process


In order to better serve the Sisterhood, P.E.O. is excited to be moving to an enhanced online recommendation and application process. Starting with the P.E.O. Scholar Awards (PSA), the STAR Scholarship (STAR) and the International Peace Scholarship (IPS), this new process will eventually be rolled out for all the P.E.O. projects and the P.E.O. Foundation.

The actual nomination and application process remains the same, just utilizing a different format that has many beneficial features, including:

 Local chapters and applicants can save a recommendation as they go along. The user can "save" their progress at any time, and in case they forget, the system "auto-saves" every ten minutes. This means the

nomination/ application does not have to be completed in one sitting. Users can save their work, quit and go back into the recommendation/ application and complete it later. Users will not have to start all over from scratch as they can return to their saved work in progress.

 The program is more userfriendly—the system looks




and works like other websites many of us frequent today, including online banking, shopping and hotel reservation sites.

 The enhanced system is also mobile-friendly.

With three projects currently on the new system (PSA, STAR and IPS),

feedback has been very positive. Both chapters and applicants appreciate the benefits, especially the ability to save their work as they go. As each project and the Foundation transition to this new program, instructions for using the new process will be available on the members website.







wrote "Ripeness is All" based on a long-hidden diary belonging to her greatgrandmother,

Jean is an artist, photographer and sculptor, and has now taken up writing. She began her art career as an advertising artist and became a graphic artist.



Kathryn Hack, G, Charlotte, North Carolina,

Kathryn's book guides the business owner to being 100 percent ready for the worst-case scenario.

Disasters are sudden, calamitous events that can bring about great loss and even failure to a business. Some can be prevented through good judgment and careful planning; others, whether "acts of God" such as fire or flood or a serious health crisis, cannot. What will happen if the one person responsible for the day-to-day operations of a sole entrepreneurship is suddenly incapacitated and unable to manage the business? Without a clear backup and disaster recovery plan, the outcome is often the total collapse of the business.

The book presents a tested strategy that has its roots in preparing for natural disasters, and replaces the all-too-common refusal to believe that bad things can and do happen with hard facts and realism.

Kathryn is a solo entrepreneur and the founder of Tiger Communications, a commercial print brokerage in business since 1999. She has a B.S. in English education and considers writing a way to change lives. Cynthia Nobles, AQ, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, wrote "'A Confederacy of Dunces' Cookbook" with recipes inspired by the delightfully commonplace and always



delicious fare of Ignatius J. Reilly and his cohorts from John Kennedy Toole's iconic novel.

Through an informative narrative and almost 200 recipes, Cynthia explores the intersection of food, history and culture found in the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, opening up a new avenue into New Orleans's rich culinary traditions. Dishes inspired by Ignatius's favorites—macaroons and "toothsome" steak —as well as recipes based on supporting characters—Officer Mancuso's Pork and Beans and Dr. Talc's Bloody Marys—complement a wealth of fascinating detail about the epicurean side of the novel's memorable settings. A guide to the D. H. Holmes Department Store's legendary chicken salad, the likely offerings of the fictitious German's Bakery, and an in-depth interview with the general manager of Lucky Dogs round out this delightful cookbook. A lighthearted yet impeccably researched look at the food of the 1960s, "'A Confederacy of Dunces' Cookbook" reaffirms the singularity and timelessness of both New Orleans cuisine and Toole's comic tour de force.

Cynthia is editor for "The Southern Table" series of cookbooks at LSU Press, a freelance writer for the Baton Rouge/New Orleans Advocate newspaper and author of the "Delta Queen Cookbook." She lives in Baton Rouge with her husband, Howard.

Algorithmic Timelines on Social Media

The phrase "content is king" is commonly heard across various communications professions. There is no realm where this is more true than social mediawhile the platforms may change, social media wouldn't exist without the content shared by millions and millions of users every day.

But how do you wade through the endless content available? Many of us have hundreds, if not thousands, of friends and followers online, and it's an overwhelming task to read all of their posts. Enter algorithmic timelines. Several social media platforms have made the change from chronological timelines to basing the content you see on factors like user engagement,

the amount of time spent on a post or its popularity with your friends, just to name a few. The content the platform determines to be most relevant to you appears at the top; what's less relevant is further down or might not even appear at all. Here's how three of the major players in social media have implemented algorithms into their news feeds.

Facebook first introduced algorithms to its news feed in 2009. Today, it takes into account hundreds of factors, all so that users see the best posts first. Its system means that you might not see some content without going to a person or an organization's profile.



Twitter made the controversial move of incorporating elements of algorithmic timelines in early 2016. Long known and valued for its strictly reverse chronological order, the platform now has features like "While you were away," which shows certain tweets in its own section in your timeline, and "Show me the best tweets first," which, unlike Facebook, gives you the option of promoting relevant content to the top.



Instagram, the most recent of the platforms to implement algorithms, stresses that all of its content will still appear, but that certain posts will come first. Many users feel that this takes away from the "in the moment" feel of Instagram, but is a natural step to keep up with the likes of Facebook and Twitter.



What does this mean for P.E.O.'s social media accounts?

You can find P.E.O. International on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and LinkedIn. While we try very hard to put out content that is relevant to our members, recipients and others who follow our organization, we also hope that you engage with our posts so that you always see our content—like or favorite a post, comment on a photo and share our posts so that you and others can continue to be reminded of the incredible impact of P.E.O.
