President's MESSAGE



Quality vs. Quantity... the continuing story

The organization that began in 1869 with only seven members at a small Midwest college started to grow almost immediately. As you would expect, the new P.E.O. Sisterhood first spread into other parts of lowa, our home base, and then to surrounding states, but as the country expanded and members moved into new areas so did P.E.O.

The earliest members realized and appreciated the value of belonging to an organization in which friendship was the foundation. Chapter members who moved to new areas missed the intimate camaraderie and companionship so new chapters and additional new members began to flourish. Today, almost 150 years since that humble beginning, the original values of our sisterhood still exist and the opportunity for continued growth is still available to us!

The values required for successful living when our sisterhood was founded are the same values needed today, and some might say they are needed in even greater measure. We cannot explain the intrinsic values of life, but these desirable traits are what define us as individuals and as P.E.O.s. Worldwide upheavals caused by changes in technologies, economies and political structures point us in new directions and force a re-examination of principles and obligations in life. But the constant and established qualities radiated by our star provide order and symmetry to P.E.O. and its members.

Through the decades the P.E.O. Sisterhood has grown through the initiation of quality women into our chapters across the United States and Canada. The membership number peaked at the turn of the century with almost 253,000 active P.E.O. sisters. After 2000, membership totals fluctuated somewhat for a couple of years, but the trend for the past seven years has been a general but steady decline. Today our membership totals about 95 percent of our peak.

Is membership important to us as an organization? Yes, it is! As a dues based organization, the dues of each member provides the income that enables us to carry on the day-to-day operations of every chapter at the local, state/provincial/district and International level.

Although dues paying quantity is important to the daily operations of our sisterhood, it is the quality of the membership that accounts for our premier position as the oldest, most continuously successful women's organization in North America. Numbers are



meaningless without the quality that brought us here. When we keep our basic values in mind, the quality of our members will deliver the quantity.

P.E.O. chapters are meant to be self-perpetuating. Renewing one's chapter with new members is required to keep each P.E.O. chapter and our sisterhood strong. The growth of membership is in your hands. You are the one to introduce prospective members; you are the one to invite and provide the mentoring as the new member "becomes" a P.E.O. It is you who will ensure the future of our great organization by actively seeking new members who will welcome membership because of our values. The quality of our members can attract and increase the quantity, but you must do your part.

Each of us has the ability to make quality contributions that will enable us to Invest in the Future of our sisterhood. Our long held values will continue to sustain us as we strive to meet our mission of furthering education for women around the world.



Our sisterhood proudly makes a difference in women's lives with six philanthropies that include ownership of a two-year women's college, Cottey College, and five programs that provide higher educational assistance: P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund, P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship Fund, P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education, P.E.O. Scholar Awards and P.E.O. STAR Scholarship. P.E.O. is headquartered in Des Moines, Iowa.



P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund

Educational Loan Fund (ELF) is a revolving loan fund established in 1907 to lend money to qualified women students to assist them in securing a higher education.



P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship

P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship (IPS) Fund was established in 1949 to provide scholarships for international women students to pursue graduate study in the United States and Canada.



P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education

P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education (PCE) was established in 1973 to provide need-based grants to women in the United States and Canada whose education has been interrupted and who find it necessary to return to school to support themselves and/or their families.



P.E.O. Scholar Awards

P.E.O. Scholar Awards (PSA) was established in 1991 to provide substantial merit-based awards for women of the United States and Canada who are pursuing a doctoral level degree at an accredited college or university.



P.E.O. STAR Scholarship

The P.E.O. STAR Scholarship was established in 2009 to provide scholarships for exceptional high school senior women to attend an accredited postsecondary educational institution in the United States or Canada in the next academic year.



Cottey College

Cottey College is a fully accredited liberal arts and sciences college for women in Nevada, Missouri, with two-year and selected four-year programs. It has been owned and operated by the P.E.O. Sisterhood since 1927.

Individual donors may make tax-deductible gifts to the above mentioned projects or through the P.E.O. Foundation. Checks should be made payable to the project or the P.E.O. Foundation and sent directly to the P.E.O. Executive Office. Donations may also be made online through the website peointernational.org. Look for the "Giving Opportunities" link on the home page.

All P.E.O. chapters are classified by the United States Internal Revenue Service as exempt from Federal income tax, but they are not Section 501(c)(3) charities. Consequently, contributions to P.E.O. chapters are not deductible as charitable contributions for Federal income tax purposes.

P.E.O. is a philanthropic organization where women celebrate the advancement of women; educate women through scholarships, grants, awards, loans and stewardship of Cottey College; and motivate women to achieve their highest aspirations.

This month's cover of the P.E.O. Record celebrates the great Chapter Challenge that is underway in every state, province and district of the P.E.O. Sisterhood. The race was launched on September 30, 2011, and the racetracks (found on our website) allow each sister, chapter, team and region to stay current with the progress of their horse as it completes a circuit around each of the four racetracks, then heads for the winner's circle.

This first-ever, interactive competition is just one aspect of the Defining Moment Campaign for Cottey College—an historic effort to raise \$35 million for the priorities of scholarship endowment, faculty chairs, library electronic enhancements, construction of a new Fine Arts Instructional Building and unrestricted funding to provide for the various needs that arise

in maintaining our 80-acre school grounds and buildings.

This five-year campaign, which began in January 2009, has already passed the \$23 million mark through the generous donations of individuals, alumnae, faculty and staff and local P.E.O. chapters. Every chapter has been assigned to a team and every team horse can be found on the racetracks. Be sure to visit our website at campaign.cottey.edu/ chapter-challenge.html where you can find which region you are playing for, which team you are on, where your horse is on the tracks and even what your horse is named! The tracks are updated each month as donations from local chapters continue to be sent in.

We are having so much fun as we work together for OUR College and we want YOU to be a part of it all.

Do you have a specific question or just want more information? Our campaign staff would be happy to receive your phone call. Our phone number is **417-448-1418**; our office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Central time).

We are heading into the back stretch and will soon start the turn for home. The competition ends July 31, 2013, so be sure to check our website frequently where you will find not only the most current standings of your horse but also fast, fun and easy fundraising ideas that you can implement at the beginning or ending of any chapter meeting—ensuring your horse keeps moving ahead. We look forward to seeing YOUR chapter in the winner's circle!

So, What Kind of Competition is the Chapter Challenge?

It's an old-fashioned horse race. There are four race tracks–P.E.O. Downs, The Cottey Cup, Nevada New Market Derby and the Star Light Stakes. Each team must complete a circuit on each race course in order to cross the finish line and enter the winner's circle. Each track is divided into \$5,000 segments. When your team's contributions exceed \$5,000, your "horse" is moved to the next track segment. With 50 chapters on each team, a contribution of only \$100 by all chapters on the team will see your "horse" moving ahead—straight for the finish line and winner's circle.

Chapter Meeting Procedure Survey Results

This is the third in a series of articles from the Special Committee to Study P.E.O. Ceremonies and Meeting Procedure about the All-Member Survey. The All-Member Survey questions related to Procedure for P.E.O. Chapter Meeting may be found in the September-October 2011 Record on pages 27 and 28.

What do today's P.E.O.s think of the way meetings are conducted? Ten multiple-choice questions about the Local Chapter Meeting resulted in quantitative answers—that is, answers that could simply be counted. The results for each answer choice are reported as percentages of the members responding to that particular question. In contrast, the final two questions were open-ended and provided qualitative responses. All comments were coded by the professional research company into topical categories and were diligently read by the committee. Examples from the abundance of comments that were submitted are available in the Read More section of The Record online.

The survey asked, Do you believe that all local chapters of the Sisterhood should follow the same procedure and have the same options for the Order of Chapter Meeting and Ceremony of Initiation? Yes was the answer. The 91.5 percent of respondents who

believe in uniformity of procedure with everyone having the same options contrasts with the 8.5 percent who do not. Desire for everyone having the same procedure and options was greater with members who had been P.E.O.s for more than 20 years (95.2 percent) as compared to those who had been members less than 20 years (87.9 percent). The regional breakout was:

 Canada
 85%

 Midwest

The next survey question asked about the password's importance. There currently are options for confirming the membership of attendees at every meeting. Here the choices were to require the password at all chapter business meetings (selected by 60 percent), to require it only when initiation and/or balloting will be conducted (selected by 20 percent), or to say that the password is not necessary at any chapter meeting

(also selected by 20 percent). A greater percentage of respondents who had been members for 20 years or longer would require the password at all meetings (65.6 percent) compared to members of less than 20 years (54.6 percent).

How important is it to have devotions at chapter meetings? Having devotions be a required part of chapter meetings was favored by 80.2 percent of respondents; 17.4 percent said they were optional and 2.4 percent considered that devotions should not be included in the meeting.

In follow-up, respondents who preferred devotions were asked their preference for a scripture reading from the Bible, an inspirational reading from any source or for the chapter to have the option of either of the above. Having only a reading from the Bible was preferred by 46.7 percent; having the option of the Bible reading or an inspirational reading was chosen by 46.1 percent;



and 7.2 percent of respondents preferred only an inspirational reading from any source.

Next, members who preferred devotions were asked to select from a list of three prayers those that are acceptable during the meeting. The list included the Lord's Prayer (chosen by 89.4 percent), the P.E.O. Prayer (chosen by 81.5 percent), and a prayer offered by the Chaplain (chosen by 47 percent; thus found unacceptable by 53 percent). A more complex question followed, asking each member to rank her preference for prayers to be used in the opening of chapter meetings and to mark any she considered "unacceptable" as such. The choices were various combinations of prayers and individual prayers, including the Lord's Prayer, the P.E.O. Prayer, and a prayer offered by the Chaplain. The P.E.O. Prayer and the Lord's Prayer together received the first-place ranking. A stand-alone prayer offered by the Chaplain received the most rankings of "unacceptable."

At this point in the survey, the second Yes/No question was posed: Would you like to see chapters have a choice in which prayers are used at chapter meetings? (based on the choices offered in the previous question.) Slightly more than half (51.9 percent) chose yes. Demographic data showed that those open to giving chapters the choice tended to have fewer years of P.E.O. experience and/or to be younger members or to be from the Canadian provinces or the Northeast U.S.

To the question about written or open ballot, 88.25 percent preferred a written ballot. (The remaining survey questions concerning balloting on membership were decided at the 2011 Convention of International Chapter with the adoption of Amendment C6, allowing two con votes in a positive vote.)

The final two questions were open-ended and provided an opportunity for members to share their ideas and comments freely: What additional suggestions do you have about the chapter meeting procedures? and What would you NOT want to see changed about the chapter meeting? True to the P.E.O. aim of "general improvement," members offered paragraphs and pages of comments. Many of these comments contained multiple topics.

In response to the first open-ended guestion that solicited additional **suggestions** came the request to keep everything the same (19.5 percent of the comments). The next most popular topic was the desire to shorten or streamline the meeting (15 percent of comments). There were many comments (8.3 percent) in favor of a familiar, **standard format** for chapter meeting and an almost identical number (7.97 percent) that targeted the reading of the minutes, long reports and lengthy correspondence as agenda items contributing to **long meetings.** There was a balance in the number of mentions of the

prayers representative of only the Christian religion (5.18 percent) and the number of comments about attention to inclusiveness of faiths (4.38 percent) as well as importance of traditions (4.65 percent). Some of the suggestions offered were for options that are currently available: reciting rather than singing the Opening Ode, not having to memorize the Ceremony of Initiation, and taking the password before the beginning of the meeting.

To the question What would you NOT want to see changed about the chapter meeting? about one-third of the comments included the desire to **retain devotions**. prayer and references to God (33.17 percent). Keeping *orderly* meeting procedures was mentioned next most frequently (17.96 percent). A sizable percentage of comments (15.16 percent) mentioned wanting **no** change. Keeping the traditions and rituals was mentioned next most frequently (10.69 percent). Consistency among chapters also held importance (8.65 percent).

Members took the questions very seriously and are to be thanked for their copious, thoughtful answers. Some answers evidenced fear of losing the special qualities of the Sisterhood, while many expressed hope that the survey findings will help assure P.E.O.'s future vitality.

How Do They Do That?

Over the years, the following local chapters have done an outstanding job of finding qualified applicants for the P.E.O. Educational Loan Fund (ELF):

- ★ Chapter T, Winnipeg, Manitoba-43 ELF recipients.
- ★ Chapter CB, Jackson, Minnesota-19 ELF recipients.
- ★ Chapter AS, Phoenix, Arizona; Chapter ED, Rockford, Iowa, and Chapter NB, Saint Louis, Missouri–each had 18 ELF recipients in the past 10 years.

The ELF Sleuth wants to know: How do they do that?

Chapter education. These chapters educate their members about ELF. When searching for prospective applicants these P.E.O.s are familiar with ELF policies and procedures. They are able to answer the questions that help a woman determine her eligibility for an ELF loan—and understand the application process.

Finding applicants. Margaret Cooper, Ph.D., Chapter NB, Saint Louis, Missouri, is on a medical school faculty and since 1989 has been finding ELF applicants. Margaret and the chapters in and near Saint Louis have successfully sponsored 71 ELF recipients. Another chapter has members' daughters who received ELF loans. They told fellow students about their loan-and these women were recommended for ELF loans. Still other chapters find applicants through contacts with college students attending members' churches.

The interview establishes a relationship. Whenever possible the chapters hold face-to-face interviews. Some chapters use an interview committee, including the project chairman and one or two other sisters, including a

sister who knows the applicant. If a chapter needs to interview a student away at school, they hold the interview via Skype.

Stay connected. Chapter CB, Jackson, Minnesota, stays in touch by congratulating the student with a \$10 gift and card upon notice of her loan approval. A photo of the recipient and a chapter sister, along with an article about the ELF loan, appears in the newspaper. Christmas and Easter/spring cards are sent until she has completed her degree. Upon graduation, the recipient receives a \$25 gift and card. Throughout the recipient's time in school-and until the loan is repaid—the chapter sends birthday, Valentine's and "thinking of you" cards. All of this is charted on a page in their chapter yearbook.

ELF loan recipients become P.E.O. sisters! ELF recipients have become members of these P.E.O. chapters. Invite a woman who has received an ELF loan to share her story with your chapter and/or get better acquainted at a chapter social event. There is no better advocate for P.E.O. than a woman whose life was touched

through one of our philanthropies. These are sisters who are eager to pay it forward. What a wonderful way to invest in the future of P.E.O.

A Message from the Cottey President

It's Fine to be 39!

The Program for Continuing Education: Not Quite 40!

Milestone birthdays are great fun, but what about the one just before? As PCE contemplates the Big 4-0 in 2013, September 2012 should also be considered a milestone of sorts, providing an opportunity to reflect on changes which occurred one year ago.

The PCE Online Application Procedure began July 1, 2011. The culmination of dedicated efforts by the P.E.O. Executive Board, PCE staff, technology staff in Des Moines and several versions of the PCE Board of Trustees led to a new way of life for a PCE grant—from the local chapter interview to the application, through approval of the grant and sending the check. September 1, 2011, was the big day when this became the only way to process a grant (no more paper!).

Letting go of paper was a thrill for some of our members and quite scary for others. Yet 1,808 applications were processed from July 2011 through July 2012, indicating the commitment of our membership to helping women reach for the stars through education. The PCE trustees will continue to provide help with P.E.O. Record articles, PCE Enews newsletters and web postings. Thank you for your patience and persistence through this transitional period.

Now, let's look back beyond 2011 at a couple of things that haven't changed, with a brief Q&A on two topics frequently causing chapters to ask "Why? What did we do wrong?"

Question: Our applicant was quite needy, but was denied because she didn't have a financial plan in place. Why did this happen?

Answer: The maximum PCE grant is \$3,000; not all applicants will receive that amount. The applicant needs to be able to show there are financial resources to cover all her monthly expenses. She needs to show a willingness and ability to find other sources of financial aid to cover not only expenses for which a PCE grant may not be used, but also those which are beyond what a PCE grant would cover. The chapter and the PCE trustees need to know that the applicant will continue school, finish her chosen course of study in the time allotted and not drop out due to lack of funds.

Question: We sponsored a woman planning to continue on for another degree after completing the one for which we'd requested the grant. Her application was denied. Why?

Answer: The PCE Policy Guidelines and Procedures states: The (PCE) grant is not intended to be used in covering the cost of prerequisite courses which may be necessary for securing admission to an educational program nor by those needing further education, beyond the current program, to gain employment. The PCE trustees applaud women who plan to secure advanced or additional degrees beyond their current course of study. However, the intent of the PCE grant

is to assist a woman in receiving enough education so that at graduation she is equipped to find employment to help support herself and/or her family.

So here is PCE: celebrating the first anniversary of the Online Application Procedure and remembering basics, which haven't changed. We look forward to continuing this Partnership for Change: You and PCE—until we are 40—and well beyond!



The analysis of recent membership numbers for the P.E.O. Sisterhood reveals a mixed bag of good news and challenges. The good news: We are still doing a stellar job of initiating new members and reinstating inactive members. Initiations, although down by 1 percent from 2011 figures, are at a three-year high. Reinstatements, up 1 percent from last year, are continuing their three-year upward trend.

The challenge: The number of members choosing inactive status increased by 11 percent last year, the biggest single increase in this population since 2006. Responses to the CEO's letter to new inactives as well as input from state, provincial and district boards indicate the reason members choose inactive status, in many cases, is a reflection of value. Our inactive sisters either don't see how P.E.O. adds value to their lives and/or the women we serve, or don't feel valued as members.

P.E.O. Membership: A Question of Value

Reason #1: Members need to see the value of what we do.

Generational studies tell us our members derive a sense of organizational value depending upon their age and life experiences. For example: Generation Y members (born between 1981- 2001) have a strong sense of

> global responsibility and are more apt to contribute

> > to things they have a personal connection to while Baby Boomers (born between 1946-1960) are cause-oriented and motivated by

leaders who show them how they can make a difference.

Understanding our mission and values is a critical component of initiating women who will actively participate. Effective preacceptance counseling helps toward that end, as does healthy chapter participation in seeking, sponsoring and supporting project applicants. We can all take ownership in the accomplishments of our project recipients and the role P.E.O. played in helping achieve them, which is why it's beneficial for new members to attend events such as convention and reciprocity events where project recipients are speaking.

Reason #2: Members need to feel valued by their chapter sisters.

Conceptually, it shouldn't be difficult for new members to assimilate into chapter life – especially in a friendship organization such as P.E.O.—yet that's often not the reality. It's important to be intentional about welcoming new members. Studies have shown us that providing good postinitiation counseling and mentoring for the first three years of membership increases the probability sisters will feel a sense of belonging.

Our commitment to sisters who can't participate actively in chapter life is equally as important. When we find ways to provide love and support to nonparticipating members, we lessen the chance they will eventually choose inactive status.



Reason #3: Members must be assured they can continue to add value to the organization.

This seems to be a prevalent attitude among many of our Traditionalist members—those born before 1945. They see work as a privilege and volunteerism as their duty. They derive value from seeing how their actions affect the overall good of the organization. When age or health-related issues keep them from participating, they often believe choosing inactive

status is the right thing to do. That's unfortunate, as we pledged our love to them as sisters just as they pledged lifelong loyalty to the Sisterhood. Rem

Sisterhood. Remaining active, though nonparticipating, allows the rest of us to practice living our vows of sisterly support.

Help Us Reverse the Trend

When the membership initiative officially launched three years ago, we asked you to grow the Sisterhood by initiating new members and reinstating inactive sisters. As a result, initiations and reinstatements have steadily increased. Thank you!

However, as you can see by the membership graph, we still have work to do. Despite our best efforts, our numbers are still declining. Too many of our sisters are choosing inactive status and we need your help to reverse this trend.


What can you do? This year, make a concerted effort to stay connected to sisters who cannot participate

actively in chapter life. They are most likely to choose inactive status.

Continue introducing your friends and family members to P.E.O. If they are women who share our values and support our philanthropies, invite them to membership. Be sure they receive good preacceptance counseling so they can make an informed decision to join our organization before they are initiated. Afterward, help them become good P.E.O.s with immediate postinitiation counseling and a loving mentoring plan.

Finally, if your chapter is too large to meet comfortably in members' homes, consider starting a new chapter in your community. Chances are good there are unaffiliate and inactive sisters in your area who would love to help you get things started. Organizing a new chapter is a perfect way to reach out to potential members and offer nonparticipating sisters an alternative meeting time and day.

There are many reasons why we need to work together to stop this decline. Increasing membership provides more opportunities to grow our philanthropies. More importantly, it signals a strong and vibrant network of sisters—which honors our Founders and, ultimately, preserves their legacy.

Crab Feed

For the past 25 years, Chapter GQ in Auburn, California, has held a crab feed fundraiser on the fourth Saturday in January. With many of the same dedicated 130 or so guests every year, tickets disappear quickly.

On this Saturday once a year, members arrive early to begin decorating with a different theme each year. This year's theme was "P.E.O." and members wore P.E.O. colors while table centerpieces displayed the marguerite. Walls were decorated with pictures of the Founders. Themes in previous years have been "Hawaii" and "Under the Sea."

Tickets sell for \$35. Guests enjoy the no-host bar and elaborate appetizers including endless shrimp and cocktail sauce prepared by chapter members while they purchase raffle tickets for donated prizes. Guests also participate in a silent auction. Other members bake cookies for dessert to accompany sherbet, or they make deviled eggs to accompany the crab. Michaeline Chance-Reay, BD, Manhattan, Kansas, authored




"Land Grant Ladies: Kansas State University Presidential Wives," which was named one of the 150 Best Kansas Books by The State Library of Kansas as part of the state's
