

The highlight of displays was seeing those seven beautifully dressed mannequins. They were absolutely spectacular.



Instagram is a social media platform that launched in 2010 and has steadily grown to become the second most popular social networking app in the United States, only behind Facebook (Source: Omnicore). Here's a little more information on what it is and why it's important for P.E.O.

INSTAGRAM AT A GLANCE

- 1 billion people use Instagram every month worldwide
- Users spend an average of 28 minutes a day on Instagram
- 52 percent of Instagram users are female
- People ages 18-29 use Instagram the most, followed by people ages 30-49
- The most popular hashtag is #Love

HOW ARE FACEBOOK AND INSTAGRAM DIFFERENT?

Facebook and Instagram are both popular options for sharing life updates and are even owned by the same company, so you might assume that there isn't much difference between the two, but that's not true.

Instagram is all about the visuals. On Instagram, the photo or video in the post is more prominent than on Facebook and has only a few lines of smaller text visible below it. You could click on the text to expand it and read more, but Instagram users are generally more focused on the visual than anything else. Unlike Facebook, Instagram does not allow any links within a post, which means there are no links back to news articles or websites.

Instagram also functions as an app, not a website, so although you can look at Instagram on a computer, you can only post and comment through the app on your phone or tablet. The idea behind this is that it encourages people taking photos on their phones to immediately post them to Instagram, giving the impression that users are seeing real-time updates.

Because of this focus on visuals and the immediacy of the platform, Instagram has offered huge opportunities for anyone with a phone and a decent eye for photography to build up a following.

WHY IS INSTAGRAM A GOOD WAY TO PROMOTE P.E.O.?

Instagram users generally skew a little younger than users of other social media platforms, so you might find younger members or potential members use Instagram more often than Facebook. Some Instagram users have also moved away from Facebook as it becomes more focused on news articles and have found that Instagram is a nice change where the focus is still on photos and videos.

This all means that Instagram is a good place to post photos of your socials, promote upcoming fundraisers and promote the projects. Please check the Instructions for Officers of Local Chapters (IOLC) fundraising section for specific guidelines on promoting your fundraiser on social media. You might be surprised by how you reach younger women in your life who rarely look at Facebook but are active on Instagram.

On the official P.E.O. International Instagram account, we have fewer followers than our Facebook account, but the number of followers is growing rapidly! Instagram is our fastest growing social media account. Our followers have jumped 95 percent from January 1, 2019, to January 1, 2020, so we know Instagram is going to be incredibly important in our future! *

INSIDE THE MARVELOUS MIND OF SCULPTOR MISCHELL RILEY

P.E.O. AIMS TO INSPIRE HUMANITY WITH MONUMENTS TO CULTURAL HEROES

You may not think of the Northern Nevada Black Rock Desert as a place for art, but the Burning Man festival of culture and art may change your mind. For many years, the dust around Burning Man has served as a backdrop to display giant art creations for the enjoyment of the 70,000 international inhabitants of the playa. The Burning Man art ethos is grounded in experimentation and big ideas. One artist who embraces this ethos is Mischell Riley, a member of Chapter Q, Reno, Nevada. Mischell employs her classical, fine arts skills, honed from more than three decades as a professional sculptor, to "Maya's Mind" in Mischell's studio bring big ideas to life with her sculptures, two of which have made stunning appearances at Burning Man.

For her next large-scale piece, Mischell wanted to create a similar awe-inspiring experience with a sculpture of a female subject, thus "Maya's Mind," a 20-foot, 6,000 pound bust of the late Maya Angelou was born. First shown at Burning Man in 2017, "Maya's Mind" then traveled by rail to the Smithsonian Renwick Gallery in Washington, D.C., and faced the White House for eight months in 2018. The larger-than-life bust of Maya Angelou sits upon a stack of books while an audio component

"Inside the Mind of DaVinci" is a fantastical piece that made its debut at Burning Man 2016. Mischell describes the experience of encountering this piece in the desert, "Imagine walking in a dust storm and you stumble upon a great big piece of art...you realize it's the face of Leonardo da Vinci—Renaissance—era art—and as you walk around it, you find the back half is rusted off. You can actually go inside his mind. Inside da Vinci's mind you find etchings of his inventions and ideas—you find yourself standing in greatness, inspired and reflecting on what you can do too." Originally placed on the campus at the University of Nevada outside Reno's Knowledge Center, this piece can now be enjoyed at the Carson City, Nevada, Museum of Art.

plays excerpts of her poem "Still I Rise." "Maya's Mind" is currently in Mischell's studio in Carson City, with a tentative plan for it to be placed in downtown Carson City in front of a historical building. Mischell prays that "Maya's Mind" will find a permanent home, ideally someplace prominent where it can reach a wide audience. Noting the disparity in numbers of monuments to men versus those to women, Mischell says, "I want to do this for women. I want women to stand in front of large monuments to feel the greatness reflected in themselves."

"Maya's Mind" is the first in a series of monuments to women that Mischell hopes to create, with plans for future sculptures of Jane Goodall and Amelia Earhart. Her aim is to increase the representation of women of all races and religions in public sculpture. "I want monuments to women to inspire humanity as a whole," she says.

Mischell was born in Phoenix, Arizona, and grew up in Colorado. She attended Oklahoma State University on a full-ride scholarship for track and field. She was a standout in the high jump; after an injury sidelined her, she put all her energy into her other passion—art. The first person in her family history to attend university, Mischell graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree.

As Mischell reflects on her life's journey she says, "I let my heart guide me and the right people show up at the right time." This certainly held true when it came to her introduction to P.E.O. In 1999 she was working on a sculpture for a bank in Miami, Oklahoma. That's how she got to know P.E.O. Ann Neal, who was a member of the bank board. Mischell recalled, "I always looked up to her (Ann). I didn't know her personally but I would see her at church and at bible studies. I felt a strong connection to her and one day she invited me to dinner. After

interacting with her for three or four years and seeing her in the community, she invited me to be a P.E.O. It was perfect timing."

When she moved to Nevada in 1992, Mischell transferred into Chapter Q, Reno. She remembers that time in her life, "When I first showed up at Chapter Q, I had not been doing so well in the arts; the market fell out and my gallery had closed. I was a broken girl when I came there but when my sisters found out I was an artist, they renewed my spirit and encouraged me to share my talents. They believed in me; seeing women being strong for women and seeing them support other women in their dreams and talents, my P.E.O. sisters revived and rechanneled my connection to spirit."

Mischell continues to be grateful for her sisters' support and understanding. "When you're in a P.E.O. meeting and you see all these women flourish, you can't have that not affect your heart," she said. "It's like they hold a flame. If you stand close enough, it will ignite your own and then you have a big flaming room of love and passion."

Mischell carries the lessons of empowerment for women by women into her personal and professional lives—"creating greatness for women through my God-given talents." She says, "What I love about P.E.O. is how it's given me this guided stairway on the next steps to what I feel my gift to humanity is. I'm taking it to a bigger level and following my heart and P.E.O. is a part of that." *

I WAS SHOCKED AT A RECENT P.E.O. MEETING When I was told that 2019 marked my 49th year as a member of our P.E.O. Sisterhood.

No way! This feat is not possible. I'm still a young woman. Well, relatively speaking. However, I realize that I'm now the age of women that I thought of as my "older" sisters when I was initiated into P.E.O. as an 18-year-old.

Before I was asked to join Chapter AJ, Pitman, New Jersey, I knew a number of my mom's friends as "Mrs. Abbot" and "Mrs. Armstrong." But moments after that momentous occasion when seven women circled me.

reciting beautiful words that lifted my spirit and brought tears to my eyes, these women were now "Prue" and "Helen." I still couldn't bring myself to calling my mom, "Marcia," but everyone else become equals—sisters—after that spring day

Despite the fact that I attended college in a different state and rarely attended P.E.O. meetings for four years, I still felt connected to my new sisters. I attended the chapter's summer BBOs every year, and met a few for lunch during holidays. When I became engaged my junior year of college, my sisters gave me a wedding shower that was better than any that my contemporaries gave me. Oh, how these women laughed when I opened gifts of flimsy negligees and softsmelling lotions. But the best gift I received from them was a handmade wooden box filled with each sister's favorite recipe. I still use it to this day, 49 years later.

I joined another chapter when I attended graduate school in which I became best friends with a woman 45 years older than me. She befriended me, knowing I was new to the town, studying voraciously while my new husband worked the night shift. I can still remember sitting in her sunny kitchen, the smell of her brownies baking in the oven as we talked about her life as a female administrator (then known as "secretary") for a large corporation back in the day when females were supposed to only be in the kitchen and attending to children.

Two years later I moved to Delaware for a new job and a new P.E.O. chapter. I brought my first infant to those night meetings until I no longer nursed, and then had a "night out" with my new P.E.O. friends until the next baby arrived. My sisters smiled as my baby gurgled throughout the meeting. In the meantime, my mom served as president of her Delaware chapter several times and then moved up the ranks of Delaware state officers, eventually serving as president of Delaware State Chapter.


Three years later, my life shifted and my two youngsters and I moved to California, newly single and knowing not a soul. But enter P.E.O., and Chapter E, where I met lifelong friends. CASCADE GOALS **TO ACHIEVE REMARKABLE RESULTS!**

I was blessed to visit the island of Maui many years ago. One of the most beautiful spots was a waterfall that cascaded down the rocks forming intermediate pools that then cascaded down to a lagoon. I marveled at how a small stream of water falling over from the top could end up creating such a large pond at the bottom.

This waterfall is an excellent illustration for how together we can achieve tremendous results through setting cascading goals. When a goal is "cascaded" in an organization, its power and impact grows. For example, imagine that an objective is set by the Executive Board of International Chapter. which then cascades to the state. provincial and district (s/p/d) leadership, who set a corresponding goal to support this objective. It next cascades to the local chapters which set a goal relevant to their own chapter to contribute to achieving the original vision. What starts as a single objective is embraced by successively larger groups and turned into a grand accomplishment together.

An effective tool for setting goals to achieve our mission in P.E.O. is the SMARTI structure. As a reminder. this is an acronym for Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Time-bounded and Inspirational, For further information and step-by-step guidance on SMARTI goal setting, please visit www.peoleadership.org and view the video "Goals, Strategies and Tactics." According to a study conducted by Dr. Gail Matthews, professor of psychology at Dominican University in California, people who wrote down their goals and action

and provided regular updates were 78 percent more likely to achieve their goals than those who merely set them in their head.

How can your chapter help support the overall objectives of P.E.O.? The goals established by the Executive Board of International Chapter for this biennium were set last fall and shared with your s/p/d leadership. Your s/p/d board will share its goals with local chapters during March so they can be used as you set your own goals in support. This is how goals are cascaded!

Your local chapter has the flexibility to choose how to achieve our shared goals and to set additional goals relevant to you. Working together on a shared vision and purpose makes P.E.O. stronger. By embracing cascaded goals throughout our organization, together we will BUILD our Legacy and Make **HISTORY**. ★

Dear Sire

We respectfully request you, as United States Senator in and for the State of Colorado, to eause to be repared and introduced in The Congress of The United States of America, a Bill, Act or Memorial, providing for the designation and dedication of all that portion of Townships Forty (40) and Forty-One (41) in Range Twelve (12) East of The New Mexico Principal Meridian, in the Counties of Sagu and Alamosa, in the State of Colorado, commonly known as The Sand Dunes*, as a Mational Monument, Park and Playground, and in support of this request, we respectfully shows

1. That the so called Sand Dunes are unique in character; widely known and unperallelled in scenic grandous nd would create a momment and playground unsurpassed, of Nationally growing interest and importance.

E. That if steps are not taken pros and segregate this territory, which is now principally unoccupied. nd remove the same from entry by individuals, small portions thereof will undoubtedly be entered and occupied by individuals thereby greatly lessening the general value to the community and to the Mation as a National Park and Playsound.

MY HUSBAND AND I HAVE BEEN VOLUNTEERS AT GREAT SAND DUNES NATIONAL PARK FOR THE LAST FIVE SUMMERS AND LOVE THIS PARK IN SOUTHERN COLORADO, home of the tallest sand dunes in North America as well as some of the oldest archaeological sites on the continent. Why is this relevant to P.F.O.?

In the mid-1920s, the Alamosa Colorado Chamber of Commerce, led by history and mathematics professor Dr. Frank Spencer, tried to boost interest in the dunes by erecting signs pointing tourists to the dunes, using hyperbole in articles in local papers and sending a letter to the U.S. Forest Service in an attempt to protect the dunes and their environs with no results, until Dr. Spencer's wife, Elizabeth, stepped in. Remember that women only won the right to vote in 1920, and that the men of the San Luis Valley had been working on this for over five years without success. Elizabeth Spencer was an active member of Chapter V, Monte Vista, Colorado. At a luncheon meeting of Chapter V in early 1930, Elizabeth touted the archaeological value of the dunes, expressed her concern that people were removing sand for construction purposes, miners were digging for gold (there is gold flour in the sand but it is cost prohibitive to recover) and that water, required to keep the dunes

fluid and at the same time stable, was being diverted for other purposes. By the end of the meeting, the Sand Dunes Committee was formed with Elizabeth Spencer as chair and Martha Jean Corlett and Myrtle Woods as members; all appointed by thenpresident of Chapter V, Anna Mae Darley.

Knowing the scope of the task before them was formidable, the women turned to the other P.E.O. chapters in the San Luis Valley— Chapter BH in the town of Del Norte, and Chapter AE in Alamosa, as well as Colorado State Chapter. These women working together initiated an ambitious letter writing campaign to recruit local, state and national politicians to their cause with the eventual goal of presenting their case directly to policy makers in Washington, D.C.

Our very smart sisters enlisted the aid of Martha Jean Corlett's husband who was not only a prominent local lawyer, but also the Lieutenant Governor of Colorado. George Corlett drafted a petition in support of National Monument status, which was adopted by the Colorado legislature, and the game was on. The women of P.E.O. sent letters and petitions to

then gressmen and other people in the federal government, the most interesting of which was to U.S. Senator from Colorado, Edward P. Costigan, reminding him that his mother was a past state president of P.E.O.! One early suggestion was to include reasons for the designation; "not Chamber of Commerce stuff but...little descriptive

stuff...along archaeological lines." Another response indicated that "... in 1924-25 sufficient information was not available to properly appraise its value" for National Monument status. Having provided this information, our sisters did a better job of informing officialdom than their male counterparts!

Finally, after tours of the dunes by officials, letters to Washington and back, committee meetings of P.E.O.s and government entities, came the letter dated March 14, 1932, giving advance notice of good news, followed shortly thereafter on March 22 by the official press release creating the Great Sand Dunes National Monument, signed into being by President Herbert Hoover. They had succeeded!

In 1940 Chapter V's Sand Dunes Committee went back into action to obtain funds for improvements to the Monument, again succeeding to protect the wonder of Great Sand Dunes. In 1976, less than 50 years later, "Great Sand Dunes had gone from being the subject of a grassroots preservation project initiated by the local P.E.O. Sisterhood to one of the most popular attractions in Colorado."

The monument was elevated to National Park status in 2000.

This past summer, while volunteering in the Visitor's Center, I made a point of telling the story of P.E.O. involvement in the founding of the park. Many mothers thanked me for empowering their children with the information. One of the seasonal rangers overheard

me and made a point of asking me to tell the story at ranger meetings. I had never mentioned that I was a P.E.O. for some reason until this summer, whereupon two of our female rangers practically shouted "I want to be one!" The Visitor's Center is slated for a major renovation, and plans are being made for a plaque to be included citing the role of P.E.O. in the creation of Great Sand Dunes National Park.

As a result of my disclosure of membership, I was invited into the archives of the park where I was allowed to read and photocopy ephemera that I have used in this article, and have quoted from a wonderful resource: "Sea of Sand" by Michael Geary. In our capacity as volunteers, my husband and I saw Native American relics, the sites of settlers' cabins from the gold rush, remains of squatters' towns and had close encounters with herds of bison and elk. Watching the shadows play across the dunes fills me with peace and calm. I can turn around and be awed by majestic Sangre de Cristo Mountains, slide on the sand in the morning and climb to alpine meadows and birch forests in the afternoon. And I am constantly grateful to those P.E.O. sisters led by Elizabeth Spencer, Jean Corlett and Myrtle Woods and to the chapters of the San Luis Valley who saved this wondrous place for us all to enjoy. *

WHAT'S UP WITH THOSE UNDESIGNATED FUNDS? We



You know, that chart showing the distribution to the six projects and lowa Wesleyan. But what's the real impact of those dollars?

If a donor wants to advance the overall mission of P.E.O. and wishes to have their donation go where it is most needed, gifts can be made directly to the Undesignated Fund in the Foundation. It also is possible to establish a permanent fund in the Foundation that is designed to support some or all the projects.

Each year the Foundation trustees ask the project trustees and Cottey College what their financial needs are. We carefully evaluate the responses, recognizing that all are worthy of so much more than the Foundation can provide. **In 2019 we had \$1,937,241 to distribute.** Let's take a look at how those funds are changing lives.

ELF Recipient Finds Her Home in Nome

amantha (Sam) Pollee is an occupational therapist in Nome, Alaska, with a deep passion for travel and adventure. Originally from Michigan, her bold spirit has already led her to multiple locations in the Western Hemisphere. She studied abroad in Chile while earning her undergraduate degree, which inspired her to develop her multi-lingual skills. She earned her doctoral degree in occupational therapy at Ohio State (Class of 2018); at this time, she knew she wanted to expand her horizons and sought out opportunities for study abroad. When asked about this. Sam shared. "A lot of the class chuckled at me. but I knew that is the direction I wanted to head." She favored Ecuador, and later completed her doctoral experience capstone there. Samantha noted, "My five months in Ecuador finishing my OTD degree was the most inspiring part of the OT program. Many stars aligned in order for me to get to Ecuador in the first place, and once down there, I could not have asked for a better experience."

Working primarily with an indigenous population in Ecuador at a rural location, Sam gained experience working with everyone from young children to older adults. This allowed her to grow as an individual and solidified her future aspirations. After graduating, Sam took her first job as a travel occupational therapist, and when a spot opened up in Alaska it caught her attention. Before she knew it, Sam was packing her bags once again—this time, for Alaska.

Although Sam expected to continue as a traveling OT, she fell in love with Nome and now proudly calls Alaska her home. She currently works at a critical access hospital, serving 15 villages in the region, all of which rely on her hospital for medical services and village clinics. A typical day for Sam includes, "a mix of acute care patients (inpatient hospital), outpatient

appointments for orthopedics, neuro, etc., and long-term care at the nursing home facility attached to the hospital which homes 18 elders from the surrounding communities."

Sam's zest for adventure makes Nome a perfect fit for her. The city has around 4,000 people split with a mix of Native Alaskans and non-Native Alaskans. Nome has a strong history with the gold rush and is now best known as the finishing point for the Iditarod 1,000-mile sled dog race. Since the rural environment makes subsistence living hugely important, many people harvest salmon, pick berries and hunt big game throughout the year. Outdoor recreation includes hiking, fat-tire biking, ATV-ing, fishing, setting crab pots, berry picking, snow machining, harvesting plants and more. This is Sam's first exposure to Alaskan Native culture and she has learned an immense amount in the past year. Sam knows OT appointments allow for a great amount of conversation and she believes that in this way, she has "been able to involve myself in learning the traditions of the Inupiaq and Yupik cultures."

Sam has followed her passion for travel and adventure and is using her skills to make a difference in her new community. The P.E.O. Sisterhood could not be more proud of this beautiful, wonderfully impressive young woman.

Doris Balgoyen, Chapter ED, Otsego, Michigan, wrote Sam's recommendation. Doris shared. "The interview team was inspired by how Samantha's educational pursuit was so perfectly tied to her passion for helping others. What we saw as fearless world travel, we now appreciate as experiences that fine-tuned her ability to assess patient needs. It's been fun to keep in touch and share her journey."

How Can I Help? Talk About Cottey College's Summer Workshop for High School Girls

Cottey is often asked, "How can I help recruit students to our college?" You can help by telling high school girls about Cottey's amazing Summer Workshop!

Did you know...

Almost 40 percent of current Cottey students have attended Summer Workshop while in high school. Thus, more than any other method of recruiting, Summer Workshop is a direct route from high school to Cottey.

What is the Summer Workshop?

Cottey's Summer Workshop is a week-long college immersion event focused on leadership and skill-building.

What do students do at Workshop?

Participants experience all Cottey has to offer in the classroom, choosing from a variety of classes taught by Cottey faculty. Students take part in the "suite life" in our residence halls and Cottey student counselors help build the full "Cottey experience" by facilitating fun evening activities.

Who is eligible to attend Workshop and where do they come from?

Girls going into their junior or senior year of high school may attend. Students come from all over the country; in fact, in 2019, we welcomed 100 students from 24 states.

When is the next Workshop, and when does registration begin?

The next workshop is June 15-20, 2020, and registration begins March 1, 2020. Visit **cottey.edu/workshop** for information.

In addition to learning about Cottey, meeting new friends, and having lots of fun, are there other perks to attending Workshop?

YES! Participants who attend and then choose Cottey as their college will receive a \$3,000 annual scholarship, up to \$12,000 for four years.

What do current students say about the Workshop?

A sophomore from Arizona visited campus while her sister was enrolled and then came to Summer Workshop. Based on those visits, she said, "I fell in love. It was an easy decision to make at that point!"

A first-year student from Colorado admitted that she "wasn't completely sold" when her mom, an alumna, told her about Cottey...until she came to Summer Workshop. "I loved all I learned and I formed a bond with my suitemates. That summer pushed me to apply."

When another student from Colorado attended the Workshop, she learned "how sweet the 'suite life' is [and about] the coursework offered and the diversity."

How do students learn about the Workshop?

A first-year student from Missouri learned about Cottey through her English teacher. "She told me that Cottey is truly unique and unlike any other college. She funded my trip to Missouri for Summer Workshop." The student reported having "a great time with such brilliant and wonderful new friends."

A junior psychology major from Colorado, stated that "I learned about Cottey through my mom, an alumna. I received a scholarship to Workshop and the rest is history. I am so happy I found a home."

Other students reported learning about Summer Workshop from:

- "My great aunt who is a P.E.O." (sophomore from Kansas)
- "My grandma, a third generation P.E.O." (first year from Arizona)
- "A P.E.O. member from Texas" (senior from Texas)
- "My studio dance teacher" (first year from Missouri)

And sometimes students learn about Summer Workshop when contacted directly from Cottey, such as a first year from Wisconsin who learned about Cottey through contact with a Cottey coach. After visiting the campus and attending Summer Workshop, she said, "I knew it would be like home away from home."

How can you help?

Talk about the Workshop with those at your work or in your church or social group. Consider having your chapter sponsor a student and help with costs of attendance. Thirty-six states have some form of travel fund, so reach out to your state. You can make a difference in the life of a student and help Cottey recruit amazing young women. *





OUR IPS CHECK-UP

The P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship (IPS) is a prestigious scholarship awarded to international women. Its purpose is to assist a select group of goal-oriented, mature, graduate-level students who have the potential to return to positions of influence in their homelands. Many of these women have overcome hardships and challenges that most of us cannot even imagine and all are grateful for the opportunity for assistance to obtain an education. What sets IPS apart from other funding options for these women? YOU! Your IPS donations and personal attention toward these deserving women are key to the impact of IPS. Sharing the P.E.O.-IPS experience promotes world understanding, which is ultimately the basis for permanent world peace.

All the current information you want to know about IPS is on the P.E.O. International website. But how much do you already know about IPS? Find out by completing this Check-Up. Check the box if you knew the right answer.

Potential IPS recipients are sponsored by local P.E.O. chapters.

FALSE: The majority of students that apply for a scholarship have discovered IPS online, through their university or from a past recipient. Some learn about IPS from a P.E.O. that has directed them to the public side of the International website, but chapters do not sponsor nor help the student with the application.

IPS is not a full scholarship.

TRUE: It is a grant-in-aid only, with a maximum \$12,500 awarded per academic year based on need. Though it does not cover a student's total expense, the priceless personal connections made with P.E.O. sisters often make it the most important part of a student's assistance.

After completion of their degree, an IPS recipient must return home within 60 days.

TRUE: An applicant must submit a witnessed statement to return home or to another country other than the U.S. or Canada within that time period.

A student who will be taking online classes is eligible to apply for an IPS award.

FALSE: A student taking online classes is ineligible because the classroom interaction, campus-life and student activities that IPS recipient graduates say enhanced their cultural experience aligns with the mission of IPS.

☐ The IPS Partners in Peace (PIP) Program provides a way for P.E.O.s to develop a closer relationship with an IPS student and experience personal diplomacy.

TRUE: A donation of \$500 made payable to the s/p/d chapter, and mailed with the required P.E.O. International Peace Scholarship Fund Partners in Peace Form to the s/p/d treasurer by January 31, will qualify a chapter or individual to be partnered with an IPS recipient with whom to correspond and become acquainted. Due to the success of the program, students are usually matched with four-six PIP chapters.

P.E.O. Groups and Reciprocities may participate in the PIP Program.

FALSE: Partners in Peace is limited to single chapters and individuals.

☐ PIP chapters are notified of the recipient partnered with them in April.

FALSE: The IPS Board of Trustees matches IPS recipients with PIP chapters in April at the time of student selection, but the chapters are notified of the match in mid-September after award acceptance is finalized. Some chapters may be in close proximity to their student, some may not, but no matter where the student is, she will appreciate chapter encouragement while she is far from home.

☐ The number of PIP chapters has declined over the past 20 years.

FALSE: The number of PIP chapters has steadily increased! In 1995 there were 132 PIP chapters; this year there are 795.

Every year IPS recipients express their heartfelt gratitude not only for their scholarship, but also for the love and emotional support of P.E.O.s. You are making a difference!

Brittany G. has a clear vision of the future as a nurse as she honors her Cherokee and Choctaw ancestors. Members of the P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education (PCE) committee of Chapter DD, Sun Lakes, Arizona, are helping the sunlight pour into Brittany's life. Mary Ann Oeschger wrote, "Brittany endured the shock of her mother dying from an aneurysm when she was 12, her father's remarriage and subsequent rejection by her stepmother. She was first placed in state care and later she was taken in by her grandparents."

While living with grandparents in Maricopa County, Arizona, Brittany had no clear path through the mist, so she decided to "stand still." She accepted an invitation from a friend to experience New York City as she put it "just to see what is was like." Brittany began to volunteer with an emergency medical service and when New York City offered scholarships for Emergency Medical Technician certification and training, Brittany jumped at the chance to enroll. "The experience was invaluable," Brittany recalled. "I became independent, grew in self-confidence and discovered that I was good with people in emergency situations."

After three years in New York City, Brittany returned to her grandparent's home where she provides care and services in exchange for rent and support. At the same time, she began to volunteer at a medical clinic serving the Choctaw Nation.

Brittany set her sights on a nursing career because she knew she wanted to use the skills and knowledge acquired through the EMT certification. Her counselor at Mesa Community College encouraged Brittany to seek out Helping Hands for Single Moms, an agency dedicated to assisting low income single mom families as the mother attains a college education, financial independence and positive family legacy. Chapter DD was quick to follow up on a recommendation from the college to interview Brittany, a single woman with two children, in need of educational assistance. The PCE committee found her to be a match for a PCE grant.

"Brittney enrolled in school because she has little-to-no income and needs to support her family, especially her son, Josh, who is living with autism," remarked Mary Ann Oeschger. "She recognizes that nursing offers a flexible platform for career development and provides interesting and readily available work. She maintains a high grade point and is in Phi Theta Kappa, the honors program at her community college."

As she continues to live within the Choctaw community, Brittany strengthens her ancestral ties. Her aunt recently provided family history for Brittany and she discovered her great, great, great grandfather was full-blooded Cherokee while her great, great, great grandmother was a full-blooded Choctaw. Brittany and her children are now registered with the Choctaw and Cherokee Nations and will soon begin a course to learn the Choctaw language. Brittany and her children, Josh and Bella, will celebrate their Native American heritage this summer by attending the annual Choctaw Pow Wow in Oklahoma.

Brittany is pleased to set an example for her children as the first in the family to gain college admission. Upon graduation, Brittany anticipates employment as a registered nurse at the nearby Navajo hospital. Health issues specific to Native Americans, including diabetes and alcoholism, will be her focus. Brittany is eager to participate in community outreach and education to Native Americans involving initiatives to encourage healthy living and balanced diets.

Brittany left her doubts behind; going forward with courage. *

4 P.E.O. SCHOLARS WHO HAVE ANSWERED THE CALL TO GOVERNMENT SERVICE

AN IMPRESSIVE NUMBER OF P.E.O. SCHOLARS HAVE ANSWERED PRESIDENT JOHN KENNEDY'S FAMOUS CALL TO GOVERNMENT SERVICE—CHOOSING TO DEDICATE THEIR CAREERS TO CHANGING OUR WORLD FOR THE BETTER.

Kimberly Krhounek (1993 Scholar) has performed long-term government service. Nominated as a Scholar by Chapter EF, Omaha, Nebraska, Kim intended to be a lawyer. "I had never heard of the Foreign Service and didn't know how one became a diplomat until I went to law school in Washington, D.C., and friends were interested in applying. I was drawn to public international law rather than private business transactions, so becoming a diplomat was a good fit for me."

Kim has lived in Haiti, Egypt, Czech Republic, France, Iraq, Afghanistan and now, Italy. She has served in domestic assignments at the Department of State in Washington, D.C. She worked under Madeleine Albright at the United Nations in New York and was there when Dr. Albright was nominated as the first female Secretary of State. As a diplomat, Kim has met Presidents Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama, as well as Secretaries of State Condolezza Rice and John Kerry. She supported then-President Obama when he participated in COP-21, the Paris conference that reached a historic climate change agreement. She has learned that "being a diplomat is a great opportunity to be a fly on the wall of history!"

One assignment Kim would enjoy is serving as a Diplomat-in-Residence at a university, which gives Foreign Service professionals a chance to teach and advise the next generation on career possibilities with the government and in diplomacy.

2010 Scholar **Kimberly Lellis–Dibble**, nominated by Chapter C, North Kingstown, Rhode Island, is an environmental scientist. She moved to Flagstaff, Arizona, for a postdoctoral position with the U.S. Geological Survey, Grand Canyon Monitoring and Research Center. She still works there as a research biologist on fishery habitat issues—like forecasting how water temperatures throughout the Colorado River basin might change in the future based on where authorities store the region's dwindling water supply: much cooler Lake Powell (held by Glen Canyon dam) or Lake Mead (held by Hoover dam). For protecting our country's fish species, the choice matters. Kim says: "I couldn't have gotten here without P.E.O."

Chapter C in Rhode Island also nominated Scholar **Nicole Rohr** (biological sciences) in 2010. She wanted to work for a government agency that "needs input from scientists to create policy." Since graduation she has worked in both government service and the private sector. She was a Knauss Fellow (NOAA grant) in the office of a Mississippi senator and



then a legislative assistant for a California congressman. There, she tells us, "I definitely used my scientific knowledge to influence federal policy." She earned a law degree, leaving science for the legal field but has returned to government work, this time at the state level—currently as a clerk at the Connecticut Supreme Court.

Kerry Danelson, a 2009 Scholar (Chapter AB, North Carolina), is Director of Research for Orthopaedic Surgery at Wake Forest School of Medicine. With Department of Defense grants, Kerry has worked with other academic institutions to conduct research in injury biomechanics. They have been working with the Army to develop a crash test dummy for military vehicles, different from the ones used in cars to determine the star ratings because it is built to measure high velocity impacts, or damage through the floor up, like from a blast.

When asked what she would tell these new generations of P.E.O. Scholars, Kim Krhounek says, "I would never have envisioned being a diplomat and living the life I have had, and it wouldn't have happened unless someone encouraged me to just apply and see what happens. Give yourself options! Seek out mentors...when I joined the Foreign Service in 1994, only 19 percent of the political officers were women. Today that number has more than doubled, and those of us who came in when it was rarer to have women doing these kinds of jobs are happy to support the next generation of trailblazers."

P.E.O. Scholars are indeed trailblazers in public service—changing the world with each new generation. \bigstar

HE SEARCH FOR THE STAR ...

THE CLOCK IS TICKING!

THE SEARCH FOR THE STAR SHOULD BEGIN NOW, TODAY, AFTER YOU HAVE FINISHED READING THIS ARTICLE! Each chapter has its own routine identifying an applicant for the STAR Scholarship. Making contact with chapter sisters who have relatives and friends who are going into their senior year, making contact with school counselors for recommendations, consulting area reciprocity groups to determine which high school will be theirs for the year...whatever the process has been in the past, **NOW** is the time for the search to begin!

Finding just the right student takes time and waiting until either late summer or early fall is really too late. Starting now will give your chapter an opportunity to get acquainted with the student and her family and to include them in summer socials and chapter activities. She is a potential future member of your chapter and she is also a good spokesperson for P.E.O. at her school. An early start will give her a much better chance for success.

As you search for a student, please also consider getting acquainted with freshmen and working with them throughout their high school career. As you review the five qualities considered for a STAR Scholarship recipient, help the young woman to identify her activities and help her to review all of her accomplishments to ensure a strong application and especially a strong essay.



After your applicant has been nominated and she receives her link to the computer-generated application, please remember that she will only have 30 days to complete the application, to ensure that her two recommenders have submitted their information, to make sure that she has listed every community service performed, to highlight all of her leadership accomplishments and to have written the most compelling essay. Whew! All of this in 30 days!

The two recommenders should be well acquainted with the student in order for them to really highlight her accomplishments. The student should be encouraged to make contact with the recommenders before the 30-day window opens. Sadly, many applications are forfeited due to late requests to recommenders. They need adequate time to prepare their answers to the text box questions and to highlight all of the student's contributions to their school and community.

NOTE: Neither the recommenders nor the chapter sister submitting the application should be members of the applicant's family.

The chapter also submits answers to text box questions and getting an early start will allow each of the answers to be more complete. Rather than just repeating her information, spell out observations about her and all of her STAR qualities. A strong chapter response will give her a better showing as her application is reviewed. Now is not the time to be hesitant about showering her with your praises and letting her star shine!

So, now is the time, pick up the phone, open an e-mail and begin the search for the STAR. ★

P.E.O.s IN THE spotlight



KIMBERLY A. REED

Last year, **Kimberly A. Reed, Chapter AF, Washington, D.C.,** was sworn in as the president and chairman of the Export-Import Bank of the United States (EXIM).

"I am deeply honored for this opportunity to serve my nation...by helping the thousands of U.S. companies that EXIM supports, both small and large, to create American jobs and grow our nation's economy," said Kimberly.

She is the first woman and first West Virginian to lead EXIM, an independent federal agency that supports American jobs by facilitating the export of U.S. goods and services.

Kimberly has spent her 20-plus-year career working in the public and private sectors and has led efforts focused on American job creation, trade, economic development, food and agriculture and government reform.

Recognized as one of the "100 Women Leaders in STEM" and Washingtonian's "Most Powerful Women in Washington," Kimberly was the first woman elected as Chair of the Republican National Lawyers Association.

Originally from Buckhannon, West Virginia, Kimberly earned her J.D. from West Virginia University College of Law and B.S. from West Virginia Wesleyan College. She has been a P.E.O. for 30 years.



TIFFAN YAMEN

Tiffan Yamen, OQ, Des Moines, Iowa, is one of the founders of Healthy Birth Day and the Count the Kicks stillbirth prevention campaign. She now serves as board secretary of the Healthy Birth Day organization.

In 2003, after an uneventful 37-week pregnancy, Tiffan gave birth to her second child—a beautiful, healthy-looking little girl who was stillborn due to a knot in her umbilical cord. Tiffan was connected with four other mothers who endured the heartache of losing a baby to stillbirth of infant death. A strong

bond quickly formed between the women and they decided to channel their grief into stillbirth prevention efforts.

They found research from Norway that demonstrated a 30 percent reduction in stillbirth by teaching pregnant women how to monitor fetal movement during the third trimester of pregnancy by doing kick counts on a daily basis. Several scientific studies indicate kick counting, or keeping a daily record of a baby's movements (kicks, rolls, jabs and punches) during the third trimester, is an easy, free and reliable way to monitor a baby's well-being in addition to regular prenatal visits.

In 2008 the group started the Count the Kicks public health awareness campaign. The next year, they created Healthy Birth Day, Inc. a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization as a way to help fund efforts to spread the Count the Kicks message.

Healthy Birth Day, Inc. has created a network of supportive hospitals, doctors and advocates across the U.S. who are spreading the Count the Kicks message. This public health campaign has gone global thanks to the free kick counting app, which is available in more than 10 languages.



NINA STAPLES Lloyd

InvestmentNews recognized **Nina Staples Lloyd, AG, Chapel Hill, North Carolina,** as a 2019 40 Under 40 Honoree. Nina, president and CEO of Opus Financial

Advisors in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, was chosen from a pool of about 1,000 nominees by a panel of reporters, editors and other representatives of InvestmentNews, to make a list of 40 talented individuals.

Nina, along with the others making the sixth annual 40 under 40 list, was highlighted in the June 17 issue of InvestmentNews. The article published by InvestmentNews notes Nina's work with P.E.O. in support of women's education. Nina is currently president of Chapter AG and chair of the North Carolina State P.E.O. Budget and Finance Committee.



THE LITTLE CHEESEBALL THAT COULD

How much can one P.E.O. chapter accomplish for women's education by making and selling 12-ounce cheeseballs? The answer is, "More than you can imagine!" Twenty-two years ago when members of **Chapter EA**, **Baraboo**, **Wisconsin**, were looking for innovative ways to increase chapter donations, sister Marge Ahlf shared her recipe for holiday cheeseballs, and the decision was made to get together on a weekend and make cheeseballs to sell.

The first effort in 1997 resulted in the sale of 168 cheeseballs for a profit of \$653.63. Every year since then the number of cheeseballs made and money raised has grown.

Prep and setup begins on a Friday evening with friends and family members joining in to cut, scoop and measure ingredients. On Saturday morning the kitchen facilities at Baraboo High School are excitedly bustling with activity as 10 stand mixers begin whirring and twirling. Cheeseballs are mixed in batches of four cheeseballs at a time, which are then chilled, rolled and wrapped for delivery to customers who say they "just can't wait to receive their EA cheeseballs!"

It's truly a day of fun—jokes, (imagine the cheese puns), laughter and singing. In 2018, Chapter EA made 968 cheeseballs; in 2019, they made 1,092. Profits from cheeseball sales over the years have allowed Chapter EA to give \$53,278.35 to the P.E.O. projects!

Chapter EA cheeseballs have become somewhat of a legend in the area with a count as high as 1,168 made in one year! 
SHIRLEY CONDIT STARKEY

The following is excerpted from a speech given by Thomas C. Watling to the New York State P.E.O. Convention last year. Tom traveled from Turlock, California, to New York to participate in the recognition of the New York State President, namely Susanna Watling—his daughter.

Tom remarked that it has been his good fortune to have been a BIL for a LONG time. His wife's mother and his wife, Nancy were members of Chapter BG, Springfield, Missouri, before they were married more than 71 years ago. Along with Susanna, Tom's daughter-in-law Diana and Diana's daughter Jaclyn, five P.E.O.s can be counted in his immediate family. Tom rightfully believes that if there were a BIL pin it would be for five stars!

Tom continued:

"P.E.O. at 150! Truly, a milestone to be recognized and celebrated. Think, for just a moment, of some of the remarkable changes—and vast improvements in our everyday lives that have occurred during that time: in travel, communication, the eradication of many diseases, our relationships with minorities and certainly in the status and treatment of women. We've come a long way—we're not quite there yet—but I can see a very bright light at the end of that tunnel.

"P.E.O. for 150 years has provided significant leadership and encouragement for women to develop their talents, perfect their skills and 'Reach for the Stars.'

The P.E.O. philanthropies include scholarships, financial grants and most notably, Cottey College, nationally recognized for its success in providing education focused on leadership, social responsibility and global awareness.

"As the oldest BIL in the room, I've had the opportunity to assist and support quite a variety of P.E.O. activities and functions—mostly by donating time and occasionally, a little money. But I must confess, those individual contributions don't really amount to anything of significance. For some time, I've had a notion that if BILs join forces there might be a better way to support the worthy goals of P.E.O.—collectively, we BILs are a vast potential resource!

"What better way than supporting the project underway at Cottey College in creating a Student Center (they have never had one!) and at the same time renovating the Chapel. The 1950s Chapel was originally financed by contributions from BILs—what a golden opportunity for BILs to work together to continue that legacy."

Tom ended with a challenge to the incoming New York State P.E.O. officers to sponsor a **BIL Chapel Renovation Fund** with a state–wide contest between individual chapters and special recognition for the chapter with the highest percentage of BIL participants. Hopefully, something like this would spread throughout all states, with New York leading the way!

"Let's make use of the dormant strength of **A United BIL Force** in active support of P.E.O. Invite us to accept that challenge! We have to be invited! Just ask us!"
